SEATTLE, July 9.-Dr. L. O. Wilcoxen, a prominent and wealthy Klondiker, is making a business trip to Seattle. The doctor has some strong views on Yukon affairs and discussed them without reservation today. After expressing as his opinion that the output for the past season would be \$20,000,000, he said:

The miners look upon it as an injustice, and all agree that it is a premium on dishonesty, as there are few who after undergoing the trials necessary to reach the gold fields last year, will, after a winter's hard work, give one tenth of their net earnings for shipment to Ottawa instead of being used locally for the benefit of the miners and the betterment of the country. There can be no question that the government is acting un-wisely and detrimentally to its own interests in the collection of so high royalty, as the extra amount received above a more just per-centage will not compensate for the loss of faise raturns. ### TWENTY-TWO SPANISH HEROES.

MANILLA, July 9.- The remnant of the Spanish garrison at Baler came to Manila by night train. The heroes who had resisted an insurgent siege of more than a year's duration formed a picturesque band. Lieut. Martin, the only surviving officer, marched them through the streets. There are only 22 and most of them are mere boys in blue cotton uniforms and red shirts. They are barefooted. A crowd of Spanish men and women embraced them, weeping and shouting their praises. they tell a remarkable story. The captain several times proposed to surrender, but the soldiers refused. Finally some months ago he tried to raise a white flag. Thereupon Lieut. Martin killed him with his own sword Their food supply gave out entirely.
