AT THE THEATRE.

LAST NIGHT AT THE GRAND

The brightest show in the calendar
played here last evening to a crowded
house. The piece was Hoyt's "A Brass
Monkey," and it proved a light and
airy production, charged with amuse-
ment and entertainment. Mazie
Trumbull as Baggage, and William
Kellar Mack, as Jonah, played their
parts in a way that was truly funny.

Jonah was nothing if not original, and
his humor lies more in his action and
the expression of his features than in
what he says. Mazie
Baggage was the cutest piece of femi-
ninity seen on the Chatham stage in
a long time. She won a warm place
at the very beginning and kept it till
the curtain rolled down. Mayne Tay-
lor as Birdie, wife of Jonah, also scored
a success. She has a splendid so-
prano voice and her rendition of the
"Holy City" and "Road to Mandalay,"
well deserved all the applause accorded.

The other parts were all well
taken and the company as a whole is
an exceedingly strong one.

"A Brass Monkey" is the most suc-
cessful show of its kind to appear here
yet, and the pleasant nonsense of the
piece puts all who see it in excellent
humor. The presentation has many
musical and dance specialties and all
proved very entertaining.

BLUE JEANS.
Joseph Arthur's beautiful comedy
drama, "Blue Jeans," opened a two
night engagement at the Grand Op-
era House last evening.

The quaint comedy, quick wit and
faithfulness of the country folks are
all well displayed in this piece, as is
also the businessness of one who goes
about among these trusting people as a
wolf in sheep's clothing. In order
to carry out his designs it is necessary
to add a tinge of the melodrama to
the piece, but this is offset by abun-
dant comedy and a strong plot.

The Rising Sun Rovers' band, and
the barbecue, both introduced in the
second act, are typical of a holiday in
a country town, and both are unique
additions to the general trend of the
play. The extent to which stage craft
has been drawn upon can be realized
when it is told that a full sized saw

mill in active operation with the whirr
and buzzing of a large five foot cir-
cular saw are shown in the third act,
forming one of the most realistic and
thrilling stage pictures to be found
with any company this season. The
scenic outfit is complete, showing, in
addition to the saw mill scene, the
home of the Tutewillers at Rising Sun,
pointed by Horace Emmons; the apple
orchard of Perry Buseom and the in-
terior of both the Buseom and Tutewil-
ler houses.

Incidentally to the piece the "Bijou
Comedy Trio," composed of Messrs.
Dorsey, Walford and Wright, are
heard in imitations of barnyard frolics.
Barnum's steam callopie, the
Irish bag pipes, and the church organ,
all of which elicited considerable ap-
plause.—New Haven Register.
