AGAINST CAPITAL PUNISHMENT.

But Juror Is Accepted In Haywood Murder Trial.

Boise, Idaho, May 27.—The unusual spectacle of accepting a juror opposed to capital punishment except as an extreme measure for the protection of society, against war and anarchy, came Saturday in the Steunenberg murder trial, and his retention, after he had shown that he was disqualified, raises a question as to the regularity of the proceedings.

J. E. Tourtellotte, a Boise architect, is the juror, and his retention seemed to be clearly due to a willingness of both sides to risk his views when the jury reaches the supreme solution of the case. But it is thought probable that when it comes the time the swear the jury, Tourtellotte will refuse the oath, and compel the court to excuse him from serving.

Besides Tourtellotte, two other talesmen qualified.

Accident at Funeral.

New York, May 27.—The funeral of Amelia Staffeldt, the girl, who was brutally assaulted and murdered at Elmhurst, L. I., Wednesday night, was held yesterday. Nearly a thousand persons attended, and it came near resulting in another tragedy. A throng of men and women crowded the porch of the Staffeldt home, and under their weight the boards gave way, precipitating many in a heap among splintered timbers. Several persons were seriously injured.

Funeral of Geo. T. Marks.

Port Arthur, May 27.—The funeral of the late George T. Marks took place Saturday afternoon, and was one of the largest ever held here. At least 100 carriages followed the hearse from the City Hall, where the body had laid in state from nine o'clock in the morning, to the church and cemetery.

Disastrous Fire In Boston Woodworking District.
