HE SWITCHED BALLOTS.

Wondering House Saw Premier Gain Two and Borden Loss One—The Militia Bill Advanced.

Ottawa, July 12.—On motion of the House to go into supply, E. Gus Porter brought up the matter of the ballot box frauds and gave a demonstration.

Mr. Blain of Peel was asked to mark three ballots for Mr. Borden, and Dr. Schaffner three for Sir Wilfrid. They were placed in the bogus ballot box in the usual way one by one. Then the box was opened and six ballots were taken out.

They recorded this vote: Sir Wilfrid Laurier 5, Mr. Borden 1. Mr. Porter explained that by a special movement of the handle six ballots previously placed in the box had been substituted for the six marked before their eyes, the latter being switched into the secret compartment by the same movement.

Mr. Fitzpatrick said everything had been done to bring the offenders to justice, and the matter dropped.

The militia bill to increase the permanent force of 5,000 was put through the committee stage and stands for third reading.

Mr. Borden's motion for an increase of the militia policy, who defended it.

In supply, on the item of \$23,000 for Dominion lands, the Opposition charged the land agents with partisanship.

Mr. Foster moved that \$2,700 be struck off the vote, being the salary of the Liberal caucus, but no decision was reached.

The question has been left in the hands of the Premier and R. L. Borden.

An hour's discussion of who was responsible for the long session made everybody tired, and at 12:30 a. m. they agreed to go home.

Discussed Indemnity.

Ottawa, July 12.—Both parties met in caucus yesterday. The question of an increased indemnity came up at each meeting. It is understood that the matter was threshed out fully.

Brampton, July 12.—Dick Shannigan of Port Credit was sentenced to one year in the Central Prison by Judge McGibbon yesterday.

The prisoner was arrested on two charges of assault, one upon his wife, from whom he had agreed to separate, and the other upon Mrs. Shelly and her newborn child, who were tenants with his wife. Shannigan served eight months in Brampton jail for a former attack upon his wife.

Defrauded Montreal Merchants.

Montreal, July 12.—James Powers and Frances Smith are under arrest on charges of defrauding a number of merchants. Mrs. Smith comes from St. Louis, Mo., where she is well connected.

Her sister arrived here Monday night and yesterday settled all the claims. It is expected that she will be released on suspended sentence.

Westwood Must Stand Trial.

Brampton, July 12.—Fred Westwood was arrested last week, charged with abducting Bessie Hopkins from the residence of Alex. Speck, 4th line, Cambridge, and appeared before Magistrate Main yesterday. He pleaded not guilty.

Westwood was committed for trial.

Paris, July 12.—The acceptance by France of the invitation to take part in the international conference on Morocco was despatched by special messenger to the Sultan last night. The messenger is expected to arrive at Fez July 15.

ALL HAS ENDED HAPPILY.

Premier Rouvier submits the Moroccan Notes to the Deputies.

Paris, July 11.—Premier Rouvier submitted to the Chamber of Deputies yesterday the notes exchanged between him and Prince von Radolin, constituting the Franco-German agreement relative to Morocco.

M. Rouvier followed the reading of the note with a detailed explanation of the negotiations. He declared that the understanding now reached between Germany and France was formal upon the essential principles fully recognizing the special interests of France.

M. Rouvier's statement was rapturously applauded on both sides of the chamber. The agreement brings a deep sense of relief to the entire country after many weeks of tension.

Both agree as to the sovereignty of the Sultan, the independence of Morocco and the open door, without inequality. This appears to put at an end the prospective subdivision of the Sultan's monarchy among European powers.

On the other hand, the agreement recognizes France's special interest in the country, due to the geographical proximity of Algeria, and its right thereby to police the frontier and maintain peace and order. It still remains for the Sultan to arrange the program of the conference.
