Blenkhorn's axe factory, where daily 70 to
80 axes are manufactured. The works
employ eight or ten hands besides the
firm and owners, the Blenkhorn brothers.
The men at the forges, anvils and trip
hammers must be urged to heat to be
able to withstand constant exposure to
the glare of the coals. The beads of
perspiration stand out on their foreheads
as the crude metal is lifted from its hotbed
and subjected to the strikers' ringing
blows or the pressure of the huge trip
hammer. The tempering completed,
the axe is smoothed on the emery wheel
completes the polishing. The same
plant power that operates the saw factory
is utilized to run a turning lathe several
hundred yards distant. The product of
this manufactory is shipped to all parts
of the Dominion and Newfoundland.
All aboard! And the *Evangeline*
steams out of Canning, and in two
hours reaches Dr. Tupper's wharf and
unloads her precious human freight for the
hotel porters to distribute through the
town.
