NEW ROAD MAP OF NOVA SCOTIA

Natural Resources Intelligence Service Issues Useful Touring Accessory.

One of the pressing problems of those interested in attracting tourists to Nova Scotia has been the lack of a satisfactory road map. To meet the demand for such a map as well as to bring before tourists reliable information respecting the many natural resources of the province, recreational and otherwise, the Natural Resources Intelligence Service of the Department of the Interior, working in co-operation with the provincial and other services, has issued a map of this province on a convenient scale. This map shows the principal natural resources, the motor roads, fishing and hunting resorts and steamship routes to Nova Scotia from adjoining provinces and other countries. The different classes of roads in the province are clearly indicated, making it particularly useful as a motor highway map. In addition to the above data a vast amount of detailed topography and other information makes the map a valuable one for general purposes. Many Nova Scotians do not appreciate the extent of motor tourist traffic to the province. This, in 1923, was represented by nearly 3,500 cars, and the present season bids fair to show a considerable influx of those tourists who are seeking a summer holiday in a pleasant environment. Copies of the new map may be obtained on application to the Director, Natural Resources Intelligence Service, Department of the Interior, Ottawa, Ontario.

HELPFUL HINTS

Rubbers.—Rubbers may be kept soft and looking like new if before they are put away they are rubbed with vaseline.

Silver Stains.—Did you know that the water in which potatoes have been boiled is excellent for removing stains from silver?

Rolling Meat.—Next time instead of rolling meat in flour before frying try toasted corn flakes. It gives the meat a delicious nutty flavor.
