

NOTED ATHLETE IS CRIPPLED FOR LIFE

Dunfermline, France, Dec. 26—Jean Caujolle, a famous French international football player and track athlete, who was mentioned early in the war for a charge which won him the military medal, is in a field hospital with both legs amputated. The bones were shattered by a shell. When Caujolle recovered consciousness and learned the extent of his wounds, he dictated a letter to his superior officer asking that he be sent to the front as a typist.

Caujolle was adjudged last year by several English critics to be the finest football back in Europe.

LADYSMITH HAS STABBING CASE

As a result of a stabbing affray on First avenue about nine o'clock on Thursday evening, one man lies seriously wounded in the hospital and his assailant is locked up in the city jail, says yesterday's issue of the Ladysmith Chronicle.

The trouble appears to have been the result of a drunken row and the participants are both Austrian miners, who have been naturalized in Canada.

The account given of the trouble is that four or five Austrians were standing on First avenue that evening using strong language in expressing their opinion in the subject under discussion, when one of them, Dan Radovitch, drew a short knife and began stabbing his fellow-countryman, Joe Bozik. The blade was a short one and Radovitch succeeded in inflicting a number of wounds before he was separated from his victim.

Mr. Dominic Giovandi heard the noise outside and ran to the assistance of Bozik, with the result that Radovitch turned on him and also inflicted several wounds, fortunately none of them of a serious character.

The other Austrians in the party did not interfere, and Bozik was removed at once to the hospital, where his wounds were dressed. It was thought at the time that the cuts would prove fatal, but later reports are to the effect that he may recover. The wounds were long but not deep, and spread all over the body, although the knife did not strike a vital point.

A number of these Austrians are now living in the city and are giving the police considerable trouble. It is felt that something should be done by the military authorities to keep them in check.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-agent in the district in which the land is situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be stated out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. Royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or sub-agent of Dominion Lands.
