CITY LIMITS

The question of the extension of the city limits has again been raised by the local Board of Trade. There is not the slightest doubt that the city limits should be extended. Things are at present, an arbitrary line divides those within the city from those who are without. As a matter of fact the city lines run along streets leaving those on one side of the street in the city and those on the other out of the city. In some cases the line runs through lots and a property holder may be in the city as to part of his property, and out of the city as to the remainder. This is against all reason and against the best interests of the city. But the difficulty is how to get those without the city limits to come into the city. It is an old, old question in Nanaimo. So far as we have noticed the agitation for the extension of the city limits has never been started by any one not living in the city limits. To the people outside it is a matter of dollars and cents. They would not object to being included in the city limits, but they object to what they will have to pay for the privilege. In the majority of cases they enjoy all the privileges of those living in the city limits. They get electric light and city water, and their roads are an infinite improvement to any unimproved city street. They may well ask themselves therefore why they should saddle themselves with extra taxes for the doubtful privilege of being brought within the city limits. As we have said the whole question has been threshed out before, and we should say that, unless there has been evidenced some inclination on the part of the people living outside the city limits to get inside, it is a waste of time to go further in the matter.

THE RAVINE.

It is a long time since we said anything about the ravine. It is with-out a doubt the biggest eyesore any city was ever cursed with, and worse than this, it is a breeding ground for any kind of noxious disease. The

trouble is that everyone is prepared to admit this, but none of our Councils have ever had the courage to propose any definite scheme to remove it. Instead of following any immediate remedial scheme, the Councils of the last few years have made the ravine the dumping ground for all the garbage in the city. Slowly, inch by inch and foot by foot the stagnant malodorous water has been covered up, but it must be admitted that, from a sanitary and scenic point of view, garbage leaves a good deal to be desired. Still the ravine is not the stinking pool nor the noisome eyesore it used to be, but a suggestion has been made to the Herald, which we pass on the Council for what it is worth. His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales will shortly pay Nanaimo a visit and he will be followed by the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire. Why, in view of these coming visits should the Council not make a special effort to cover up the ravine for once and all. The suggestion made to the Herald is that there is sufficient material laying in the ravine, from the filling in that was done by the Western Fuel Company some years ago, to cover up the whole thing. Of course permission would have to be obtained from the Company to move this material, and it would cost some hundreds of dollars to move it. But, provided the Company granted its permission, and the Council was brave enough to vote the necessary money, the ravine could be cleansed of all its unsightliness. Personally the suggestion strikes us as being an eminent sensible one and we recommend it to the consideration of the Council.


