It is stated that the Prince de Joinville is to undertake a long voyage in January. He will sail from Toulon with a squadron.

Her Majesty contemplates a visit to Berlin, next spring, and thence to Paris.

Welsh Coal is now lower than ever it was known. The shipping price at Newport and Cardiff is 7s. 6d. per ton for housekeeper's coal; a few years ago it was 11s.

War steamers are to be placed upon the large navigable lakes in the interior of Ireland, and machinery suitable to the respective localities is in course of preparation at Liverpool.

The O'Connell rent for Dublin, on the 19th ult., amounted to over £4000.

Thanks have been voted by O'Connell's friends to the Clergy of Ireland, for refusing the Government stipend.

Mr. Ray, the secretary of the repeal association, who entered Trinity College last term as a student, has been summoned before the board, to account for his connection with the repealers.

The birth of a daughter to Lady Villiers has made Sir Robert Peel a grandfather. There is a whisper that the Queen will stand sponsor for the infant.

Upwards of 12,000 seamen are out of employment in London.

The Bahama Islands have been added to the Bishopric of Jamaica.

A medallion is to be struck in memory of the late Dr. Southey.

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The last Overland Mail from India brings no certain news of any importance.

In the neighborhood of Cork, the Police visited six places where fires had been seen, but they found only embers, and a few straws, every thing was quiet, the houses closed, and the people apparently in bed.

Assassinations continue to take place in this country. Besides Shere Singh and the whole of his family, it is now known that the ruler of the Mooltan, Dewa Singh, and his family, have also been murdered. Duplep Singh, a child of six years of age, has been placed upon the throne.

The Affghans, it is said, threaten to descend on Peshawar.

In Scinde sickness continues to be very prevalent.

From China there is no news of importance. The Opium trade still flourishes, and seemed likely to do so.

The Bengal troops, about 12000 in number, are to stop at Feroze pore.

The crop of indigo this year has been ascertained to about 160,000 maunds.

The Taunton Conservatives have united themselves together in no association to oppose the League in that district.

Earl Fitzhardinge has refused to join the League in an attempt to secure both the Parliamentary seats of Bristol for the free traders.

We regret to announce the death of the Countess of Mayo at Bersted Lodge, Bognor, which melancholy event took place on Sunday week.

Mr. Duncan McNeil, Lord Advocate for Scotland, has been elected Dean of the Faculty by a large majority.

The Limerick repealers give Mr. Smith O'Brien, M. P., a public dinner on the 4th Dec.

The Hon. Judge Crampton will shortly lead to the hymeneal altar the amiable Miss Duffy.

Stationary Provosts. It is rather a curious coincidence, that the chief magistrates of London, Edinburgh, Glasgow and Perth, should at present all be members of the respectable fraternity of Stationers.

Government have offered an increase reward of 150l. for the apprehension of the men who attacked Mr. Waller's house; and Mr. Bregeord, a magistrate, has offered 500l. for their conviction, and 100l. for private information of each person concerned.

The trial of Lieut. Munroe and Lieut. Grant, for their part in the duel which was fatal to Colonel Fawcett, and which was fixed to take place on Saturday last, has been postponed.

The rev. John Cumming, M. A. one of the most eloquent advocates of Protestantism, was elected on Thursday last as chaplain to the royal Scottish Hospital, in the place of the rev. Dr. Brown.

The militia law of Rhode Island does not exempt females from performing military duty, and several have been arrested and confined for disobeying the said law.

A grand dinner took place at the Palace of St. Cloud on Saturday, on the occasion of the thirty fourth anniversary of their Majesties' marriage.

We learn by a letter that the English and French governments have both acknowledged the Buenos Ayres blockade, through their ministers, and the Brazilians, after talking some time of concluding a treaty with the Monte Video, have deserted them, and left them to their own resources.

On Monday information was received in town of the destruction

by fire of Rowcleas, the mansion of Lord and Lady Nugent, near Exeter, on the morning of Thursday last. The damage is stated to be at least 3000l. No lives were lost.

Mr. William Jeffcott has been appointed one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of New South Wales, and to be resident Judge in and for the district of Port Phillip.

A Paris paper reckons the annual revenue of the royal family of France at thirty millions of francs (1,200,000l.), and the saving for the last thirteen years at five millions sterling, independent of the savings made by the King when he was Duke of Orleans.

The appointment of the chief Justice of Wellington, New Zealand, has been conferred upon Mr. H. S. Chapman of the Inner Temple, who has sailed in company with the new governor, Captain Fitzroy, late member for Durham.

The Lords of the Treasury, on the recommendation of the Board of Customs, have raised Glasgow from being a second class port to the first class.

The following notice is posted at the Jerusalem Coffee House:—The outward overland mail is detained till the 6th Dec.

The health of the Duchess of Gloucester still continues in a very precarious state.

The convict Stolzer has been removed, with seventy other convicts, to the Penitentiary at Milbank, under sentence of transportation for life.

On the Duke of Buccleugh's birthday he gave away one hundred and fifty tons of coal in the poor of Edinburgh and Dalkeith.

The Earl of Harewood has given the munificent donation of three hundred pounds to the subscription for the restoration York Minster.

A report prevails according to a letter in the Banner of Ulster, that Mr. Irving, M. P., intends to resign his seat for the county of Antrim.

A lady being asked her opinion of the odious income tax, replied that it was incommodious.

Exertions are being made to obtain the release of Mr. Oastler from prison.

The League fund progresses, 16,000l. being already raised, and 20,000l. being expected from Manchester alone.

The adulteration of Guano is said to be carried on in this country to a dangerous and unwarrantable extent; one amongst the numerous methods by which the efficacy of this valuable manure is materially impaired is the admixture of stone ground into a fine powder.

A great reform is intended in the military affairs of Bavaria, Wurtemberg, and Baden. It consists in the establishment of a militia, similar to the Prussian Landwehr.

A clue has, it is said, been ob-

tained to the incendiary who set fire to Messrs. Robinson and Co's premises. The amount of loss sustained will not exceed 12,000.

WALES—Four Rebeccaites have been committed at Fishguard to be tried at the assizes, for destroying the gates and tollhouses at Parkmorfa and that place, have been held to bail, themselves in 100l. each and two securities of 50l. each. 23 others have also been committed to take their trial for the same offence, and have been held to bail in 50l. each, with two securities in 25l. each. Much excitement prevailed in the town and neighborhood of Fishguard, and the informers Thomas Williams and wife, had incurred the displeasure of their riotous fellow countrymen to such an extent, as to render it necessary for them to be placed under the protection of the military.
