The text is a part of St. John's description of the New Jerusalem. One of the perfections of this city was its symmetry. As that city was symmetrical in all its parts so must the perfect life be. If we would strive-after the perfect life not only length of days must be desired but breadth and height of life as well.

The world has no more beautiful picture to show us than a young man or woman just starting out in life. The perfect, fully rounded life has the three sided development illustrated in the text.

The Length of Life.

In that life which approaches the nearest to the ideal a time when the young person says, Here is my life work; this is my calling. His bent, his inclination, his talent lies along that line. Through every life there runs a sharply defined, tense, straight line. That is length of life. No man finds less tolerence today than the aimless man. Young people should find their life work, and stick to it until its completion has been reached. Have a purpose in life and stick to that purpose.

The Breadth of Life.

The Breadth of Life.

There is breadth to a man's life as well as length of days. When a man has length and breadth together then we feel that we have a strong man. The man whom the world delights to honor is he who having found his own life work reaches out to help his fellow men. One of the best illustrations of the fully rounded life was that of the late Mr. Randolph. His life reached out in all directions and helped every man with whom it came in contact. If we would add breadth to the length of our lives we must reach out to the generation in which we are placed.

The Height Thereof.

The height Thereof.

The height of a man's life is its reach upward to a power he recognizes as above and supreme to himself. If a life is to be symmetrical its reaching up to God must be equal with its length and breadth. This is the life he would have young people see and strive for. When a young man once sees the life touched by the Divine he cannot thereafter be contented with common things. The sermon closed with a forceful exhortation to the students to strive after the symmetrical, fully-rounded, cubical life.

LORD PAUNCEFOTE DEAD.

The Brttish Ambassador at Washington Passes Away - A State Funeral.

Washington, May 24.— Lord Pauncefote, the British ambassador, died at 5 o'clock this morning. About 2 o'clock he suddenly developed a very weakened heart condition and a consultation of his physicians was called. They were unable to rally him and he died peacefully, not having regained conscioussess from the sleep he fell into during the night.

Rt, Hon. Sir Julian Pauncefote, T. C., G. C. B., G. C. M. G., K. B., was born in 1828. He was a son of the late Robert Pauncefote of Preston Court, Gloucestershire, and was, educated at Paris, Geneva and Mariborough College. He was made a barrister of the Inner Temple in 1832; became private secretary to the late Sir William Molesworth, secretary of state for the colonice; practised at the Hong Kong bar for several years, was attorney-general of Hong Kong in 1868, chief justice of the Leeward Islands in 1874; assistant under secretary of state, for colonice, 1874; assistant under secretary of state, foreign affairs, 1882; delegate for drawing up an act relative to navigation of Suez Canal, 1885; envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to the United States since 1893.

LUMBER HUNG UP.

About 30,000,000 Feet Stranded on the Upper St. John Waters.

Rise of Couple Feet of Water Would Bring Most of Logs Down

John Kilburn Home from His Drive-

Thirty million feet of logs are hung up on the Upper St. John, and will need copious rains to bring them down this season. John Kilburn returned on Saturday night from the scene of his lumbering operations. The tail end of his drive is nine miles above Seven Islands, and forty five or fity miles above coporation limits. There are about five millions in this drive and Kilburn has another five million in the drives of Noble and Belanger further down; and hung up as well. Kilburn left thirty men on the drive and has them hired for a month, and hopes that there will yet be a sufficient rise of water to bring the lumber out. He is considerably further down fiver than when he abandoned his drive a year ago and is in a much better position to take advantage of any rise of water. Mr. Kilburn says that this has been the coldest and most backward spring be has experienced since he has been in the lumbering business. He expects to return to the upper St. John next week, or scoper if there should be rain. Mr. Kiburn fet his drive on Thursday last, coming down river from the drive to Edmundston in a boat, and taking the train at the latter place.

Between Kilburu's drive and the corporation limits some twenty five millions of lumber is stranded. W. J. Noble is bung at Priestly Rapids, nine miles below Seven Islands, with 6,000,000 for Cushing and 3,00,000 for Dickey, the latter to be sawed at Fort Kent. Noble was at Edmundston last week and returned to his drive on Thursday with a crew of men and will stick to the drive for a while yet, with the hope that rain may come in sufficient quantity to make a rise of a couple of feet of water, which would bring the lumber down. Noble's men and also those of Kilburn are at work sacking the logs from the shores to the bed of the stream.

Belanger, who operates for Cushing, has 6,000,000 feet in the same place as Noble's and is in a similar position.

Chinouard is stuck at Willett's Bar, only six 'miles above the corporation limits. He has between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 for W. H. Murray.

Kilburn and Noble between them have a million and a half for the Dechenes, this being mixed in with their other logs.

Silas Dickey is hung up on the Al legash with 3,000,000 for Stetson.

Those Clair is nigh and dry on Little Black river with the tail end of his drive for Stetson. He has brought out between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 and is hung up with 1,500,000. Other Lumber Hung Up.
