

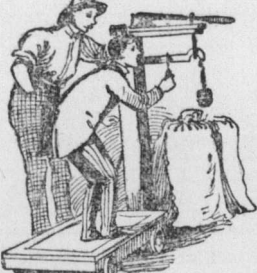

## COLOR SUGGESTIONS.

What Colors Make Good Combinations. Skirts and Blouses.

The following general rules on color effects in dressing are taken from a trade catalogue: Red and violet do not accord well. Orange and yellow accord incomparably better than red and orange. Orange and green do not accord well. Yellow and green form an agreeable combination. Greenish yellow and violet blend nicely. The arrangement of yellow and blue is more agreeable than that of yellow and green, but it is less lively. Green and blue produce an indifferent effect, but better when the colors are deep. Green and violet, especially when light, form a combination preferable to green and blue. Red and green intensify each other. Orange yellow when placed by the side of indigo increases its intensity, and vice versa. Yellow and indigo combine perfectly. Red and orange do not accord well. Red and yellow accord well, especially if the red is purple red rather than scarlet, and the yellow rather greenish than orange. Red and blue ac-

cord passably, especially if the red inclines rather to scarlet than crimson. Blue and violet accord badly. Black never produces a bad effect when it is associated with two luminous colors. While gray never exactly produces a bad effect in its association with two luminous colors, yet in most cases its associations are dull. Blue when placed by the side of orange increases the latter's intensity, and vice versa.

It is related that the ancient Roman ladies, who were luxurious in the extreme and required the services of not one but a score of maids to attend to the toilet, sometimes dyed their hair blue. How soon history will repeat itself in this respect is a question for mathematicians and scholars to settle.

The walking gown shown in the sketch is of beige wool goods. The bodice skirt is plain, while the blouse bodice has a deep yoke in front, defined by shaped pieces of guipure, below which are two full panels of blue satin let in on either side of the front and terminating under two buttons. The belt is of satin and standing collar of guipure. A short, open jacket with revers of white pique accompanies the gown. The hat of tobacco brown straw is trimmed with blue ribbon.

#### VARIOUS NOTES.

**The Graceful Fichu—Light Spangles For Summer Trimming.**

The popular demand for capes, fichus of various forms and light vestments of every style of plain and decorated lace has filled the shops with an immense number of such articles.

These are often very cheap, but made of coarse lace and consequently soon soil and become rough. Any one who is not hand-crafted can make these fichus and have one of really good lace and velvet or satin for less than the price of an inferior sort ready made.

Jet is as fashionable as ever and as heavy. Their light weight is the chief advantage that black spangles have over jet, for they are not so rich looking, although more flashing, but as they may be worn in immense numbers without greatly increasing the weight of the garment they adorn many women prefer them for summer trimming. The inside of the very full folds that are the distinguishing feature of the new skirts are ornamented with jet and

broader or embroidered lace or passementerie. This is laid on in stripes, broken or continuous. Capes are treated in the same manner.

Parisian shops are selling quantities of small pieces of light furniture, simply made of white wood, these to be covered at home with plush, cretonne or other upholstering fabric by the deft fingers of the mistress of the house. The goods are nailed on with invisible nails which come for the purpose, and the edges are afterward concealed by gimp fastened with gilt headed tacks. Small tables thus covered are particularly satisfactory, either for the drawing room in velvet or for the bedroom in flowered chintz to match the hangings and cushions. The liberty fabrics are beautiful for this purpose, both the stamped velvets and the cretonnes.

Scotch plaids, so called, continue to be worn in Paris by fashionable women, although they are not seen everywhere. In summer silks they are especially liked and are often very effective. The bodice shown in the sketch has a blouse of embroidered tulle over sky blue silk, ornamented with a curiously cut bertha of deeper blue velvet bordered with sky blue. The balloon sleeves, which reach to the elbow, are of red and deep blue plaid on a sky blue ground. The draped collar and belt are of blue velvet.
