The weather seems to have become settled, and a correspondent improvement in the progress of vegetation has taken place; we should, however, say, that there is at least ten days' difference between this season and the last in favor of the later. It is true that plants sometimes grow with a rapidity that makes it immaterial whether the seeds are sown a fortnight earlier or later. We have, in fact, several times experienced, that seeds sown in the last week in May, or in the first week in June, have produced plants that have perfected themselves quite as early as those sown ten days or a fortnight earlier: but, as a general rule, we counself sowing early; a fuller and more abundant crop is usually the consequence.

Our farmers are we doubt not, taking advantage of the fine weather; never had men greater inducements for exertion. Potatoes are now 4s 6d per bushel and flour and meal with every description of grain at corresponding prices. Meat, butter and eggs are higher than we ever knew them, and a cartload of codfish from the north shore sold at prices which that highly respectable gentleman, the oldest inhabitant, never dreamed of.
