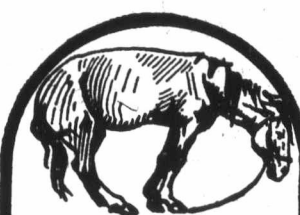

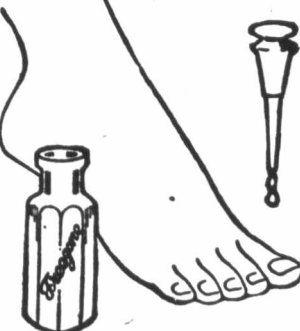

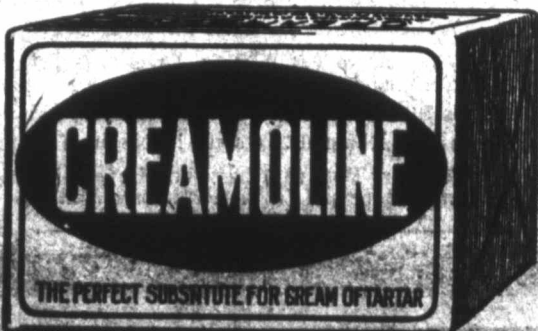

Millerton School Fair A Great Success

The annual School Fair was held
this year at Millerton other districts
taking part were Kirkwood and
Upper Derby.

Director A. C. Gorham in his re-
marks congratulated the teachers
and pupils on the fine showing and
the way in which the fair was
organized and carried out.

The Products exhibited were from
the pupils home plots grown from
seed sent out by Department of Ag-
riculture also produce from the
School Garden.

It was explained that the school
garden is supported from the gov-
ernment grant for Agricultural Edu-
cation.

The work of Agriculture in the
Schools is growing rapidly. Last
year there were 1,500 plots this year
4,000. Twice as many eggs were
sent out this year. There being
1000 dozen distributed among the
different districts in the province.

All the exhibits were of good qual-
ity and results can be seen of the
teaching along these lines.

Quite a large number of parents
and rate payers were present and
expressed themselves as greatly
pleased with the exhibits.

The Rev. Mr. Scott and Rev. W.
McN. Matthews spoke to the pupils
congratulating them on the excel-
lent work they had done.

Clark.

King Scored

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—I am sorry to
narrate with Mr. King's romancing,"
said Hon. C. C. Bantynne, minister
of marine and fisheries, today when
shown Hon. H. L. Mackenzie King's
reference in his speech at Victoria,
because, to the Canadian Government
Merchant Marine, "no person of
sense would credit such a statement
as that it is wholly false—not a
contract was signed, not a dollar
was spent until the authority of
parliament was first obtained."

The Original Charge
Mr. King's reference to the mer-
chant marine was reported as fol-
lows:—"Scarcely less automatic has
been the government's procedure in
the expenditure of seventy millions of
the people's money in the creation of
a merchant marine. No ministry
should have ventured to award con-
tracts of one-tenth or one-hundredth
of this sum without in the first in-
stance coming to parliament for au-
thority to do so."
