er great, from the London Times, ever the spokesman for the heart of that Empire: "The romance, imagination and fine colour of the Empire builder are blended in the life story of Lord Shaftesbury. Himself a subject of the United States, he lived to become not only a citizen of the Dominion of Canada across the border but most essentially a citizen of the British Empire, for his whole-hearted and efficient work was not confined to the service of his country. Under his administration, the double track branched and extended so as to carry new settlers every year into the farmlands of Ontario, through the gateways of the West into the wheat-fields of the prairies, and beyond the Rockies into the valleys of British Columbia. In building the greatness of the Empire he served, he helped to build the greatness of his beloved country as well. As a subject of the United States, Lord Shaftesbury it may be said that he was a living instance of the manner in which Britain's overseas dominions assimilate the many elements of which they are composed. He came to this country as a subject of the United States; he remained to be honoured by the King, to whom he gave such loyal allegiance, and to be recognized universally amongst his fellow-countrymen as the first citizen of the Dominion."
