FORT SASKATCHEWAN.

A fairly good audience turned out to the Town Hall last night, to hear Rev. Dr. Shearer, the retiring secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, speak on the new act, which is now in force throughout Canada. Rev. A. Forbes acted as chairman, and Rev. Canon d'Esseau was also on the platform.

Rev. D. Shearer in opening his address, referred to the changes in the observance of the Sabbath. The year 1906 had been essentially a Lord's Day year. In this year, Canada, the Argentine Republic, France and China had passed laws for Sunday observance. In 1904 Spain and in 1905 Belgium had passed similar bills. The speaker referred to the "Holiday Sunday" as it was observed in France, for many years and pointed out that that had been the case in this country. In recent years, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier visited France and saw the strict observance of the Sabbath, he determined to do everything in his power to prevent such a condition of affairs in his own country. Therefore when the Canadian bill was before the House of Commons and denounced by Bourassa, it was owing to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's efforts that it got the support of the French members, with four exceptions. Seven days previous to the Canadian law being passed, the French people got their new law, the motto being "Rest, and let rest be on the Rest Day. The platform of the Lord's Day Alliance had taken, was that a man could do as he liked on Sunday as long as he did not interfere with anyone else, but when he deprived some one else of his rights the Sabbath non-observance he determined to do everything in his power to prevent such a condition of affairs in his own country.
