There is an abundance of herring around the shore.

Wireless From the Rosalind.

The Rosalind left Sydney at 6 this morning and at 10.30 Harvey & Co. had a wireless message from her reporting her to be then 260 miles west of Cape Race. This much have been transmitted through another vessel, as the apparatus on the Rosalind cannot carry any further than 200 miles. The ship is expected at 3 p.m. to-morrow.
