The attempt to kill Congressman Miguel, when it became generally known, caused intense excitement throughout the city. Congressman Lora was not arrested because of his congressional standing.

THE "ROYAL EDWARDS" RECORD

LONDON, June 27.--A keen fight for the Canadian mail contract is evidently to be made by all the steamship companies in the North Atlantic trade. The advent of the Canadian Northern Railway Co. Steamers Royal Edward and Royal George, the first of which has already broken two speed records, has made the other companies take quick action to retain their supremacy, and several orders for new vessels capable of high speed has been announced. Success seems to have come to the new company immediately from the despatch of the first of its vessels, which are recognized as the fastest plying in the Canadian trade. The Royal Edward holds the blue ribbon for this route by making the run in five days and seventeen and one-half hours. Her previous best time, which she made on her maiden voyage, was also a record for the southern route.

Sensational Report.

At 1 p.m. yesterday a little girl named Roll, reported that a man named Moss had been found dead at his residence, 64 Cabot Street. The rumour was conveyed to Supt. Grimes, who with Inspector Collins investigated. Both visited almost every house on the street but could find no such person there. Later they discovered that the man resided on James Street. His wife, who is very ill, was taken to hospital on Saturday, and the old man has since been living alone in the house. The place was locked up and the officers forced an entrance through the window, but found no person in the place. A neighbour said that Moss left the house at 8 o'clock on Sunday evening, and that he had a sister living on the South Side. Moss turned up at his home all right last night.

Foreign Wanderers.

Last night up near the railway station Const. Lee found a foreigner wandering aimlessly about the place. He could not speak a word of English. He had a fifty-cent piece in his pocket. It could not be ascertained where his companion had gone, and the officer brought the man he had met to the police station. He met Conductor Kelly of the Reid Nfld. Co. on his way and he recognized the man as one of the two who had joined his train on the 18th inst., and had left it at Upper Gullies. On the person of the man taken into custody was found a paper showing that he had come here on the Carthaginian. The man is poorly clad, is of a dark complexion, stout, but of low build. Where he and his friend came from could not be ascertained last night.

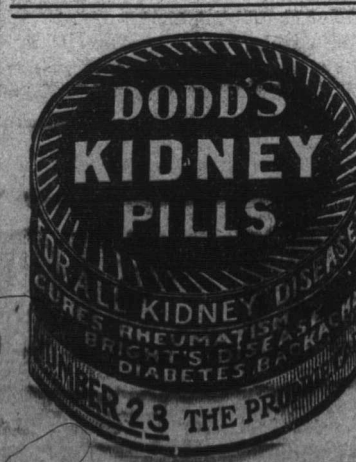

Doing Good Work.

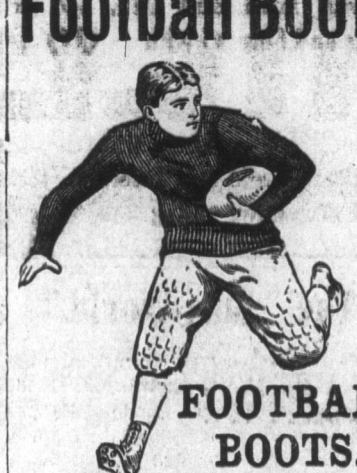

"Very stormy trip right throughout. There is very little improvement in the fishery on the Newfoundland side. Whiteley is doing nothing with traps, but is getting a little fish on hook and line. There is no fish west of Bonne Esperance for some distance. There is a good sign at Henley and Chimney Tickle. Caplin are just beginning to strike in."

Woman Becomes Ill.

Yesterday afternoon a seaman who was captured by the police, and who it was believed was trying to desert from his ship then ready to sail, was brought down to an uptown wharf to be put on board. He was followed by his aged mother who did not want him to go into the vessel, and while she was on the pier she was so overcome that she fainted and restoratives had to be applied.
