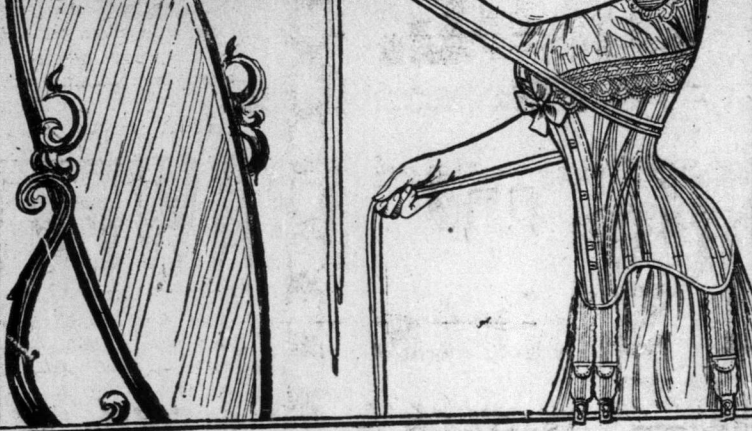

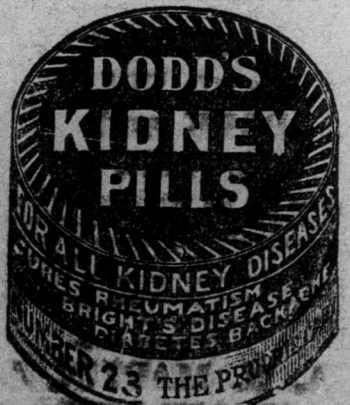

Handsomeness Newspaper Building.

Yesterday the staff of the Daily News began work in the new office erected on Duckworth Street. Just east of Dr. Rendell's residence. The exterior of the structure, which is built of concrete, presents a handsome appearance and is quite an addition to that thoroughfare, while the interior appointments are in keeping with the appearance of its imposing exterior. The offices of the editor, Mr. Currie, the reportorial staff and the business department occupy the front of the building on the ground floor, are lathed and plastered, beautifully painted and decorated, well ventilated and lit throughout, as is the whole interior, with electric light, and heated by radiators. The business office counters are guarded by handsomely wrought bank screens and excellent lavatories are also situated on this flat. Immediately at the rear of these offices is the spacious composing room, and on the upper flat is located the job department, another spacious, well lit and nicely ventilated place and with every convenience and comfort for the workmen. Here also is situated the stock room; while in the basement, which is solidly floored with concrete, are three fine power presses. This apartment is also of a most modern type, containing every convenience and being finished with an eye to the comfort of those who work there. The offices have been newly furnished and three linotypes will be operated in the composing room, while the Free Press will also be issued from the new office. Military riots are reported to have occurred at Longmoor Camp, where there is a mounted infantry school connected with the Aldershot division. The Scotsmen among the troopers on New Year's Eve became incensed on account of the curtailment of the holiday. It is stated they smashed up the huts and bombarded the officers' quarters with bricks. The assembly was sounded and all the officers called out to quell the disturbance of the mutineers, who formed a square and kept off their superiors. Eventually an officer, who is a noted boxer, challenged one man to fight. The men formed a ring around them. The man stood up to the officer but was badly defeated. Upon this the men sullenly returned to the wrecked huts. It is reported that one man was shot and another wounded during the affray.

Declared a Wonder!

A New Yorker, who follows the pugilists, writing to the sporting editor of the Recorder says: "Of all the fighters on the face of the earth, Mike Gibbons is the greatest. I thought that Driscoll, Wells, Kid McCoy, Jack O'Brien and Packey MacFarland could fight, but they cannot be spoken of in the same breath. Gibbons, who comes from St. Paul, and is but 20 years old, has boxed with Hillard, Laing and others in the Northwest, but it is only within the past two months he has become known in New York, where he engaged in three bouts with Sherman, a former sailor; Willie Lewis and Walter Coffey. He has returned to St. Paul for the Christmas holidays, and on his return to New York next month he will be ready to meet all-comers." The New York Sun says:

"The remarkable feature of Gibbons' ability is the fact that he combines boxing skill with hard hitting. Corbett, Ernie, Griffo and other star boxers of olden time lacked punching power, but they won bouts on points. Gibbons, on the contrary, can slug with both hands if necessary in addition to piling up points with wonderful skill and rapidity. Abe Attell, the featherweight champion, also a great boxer, after watching Gibbons' trim Coffey, said:

"Gibbons has a head. He is one of the fewest men I have ever seen. One of the secrets of his success is the way he makes the other fellows miss. He doesn't jump away so far that his opponent misses him by a yard, for that would be discouraging. He avoids blows by so small a margin that his antagonist constantly believes he can land if he keeps on trying. In that way Gibbons makes his man fight just the way he wants him to, which is something few boxers can do. His feinting is a treat. His footwork is marvellous and when he starts to punch he doesn't miss. He has a wonderful pair of eyes and is a quick thinker. He likes to box, but if slugging is necessary he's there, with an awful kick. Just say for me that Gibbons is a wonder."

Boston, Dec. 22.—Five persons were taken into custody after the discovery by the police to-day of the partly dismembered body of Miss Mary Bolduc, aged 22 years, of Manchester, N.H., in the apartment of Mrs. Jennie Shattuck, in the Forest Hill section of Jamaica Plain. Medical Examiner Leary said death was due to an illegal operation.

Within a few hours of the finding of the body, Mrs. Shattuck and Miss Hattie Hazel, of Cambridge, were taken into custody at the Forest Hills apartment, and Dr. John D. Ferguson, of Manchester, and the clerk in his office, Miss O'Neill, were detained by the New Hampshire police at the request of the Boston officials. No formal charges have been made against them pending further investigation.

This evening the police of Fitchburg arrested Anna W. Reed, aged 50, and booked her on the charge of murder in connection with the death of Miss Bolduc. She gave her occupation as a dressmaker and lodging house keeper in Boston.

Dying, Directs Rescue Work.

Foreman Crushed to Death Under 20 Ton Boiler.

Brooklyn, N.Y., Dec. 19.—Porter Kinsman, 60 years old, foreman of a gang of workmen, was slowly crushed to death under an immense boiler which his men were installing in the candy factory of Levine Brothers, at 32 South Ninth street, to-day. While he lay dying and in terrible agony, pinned between the boiler and the brick bed in which it was to have been placed, he kept his nerve and calmly directed the workmen who were trying to extricate him. He died a moment after the great weight was removed.

Working with him as assistants on the job were his two sons, George and Bert Kinsman, and they were compelled to stand by powerless and see their father crushed to death.

The brick firebed on which the boiler, an enormous one weighing twenty tons, was to rest, had been prepared for it. The boiler itself was on props nearby. The idea was to raise it by means of a hydraulic jack and gradually swing it into place.

Kinsman stood by the end of the boiler and between it and the brick firebed directing the work. One of the hydraulic jacks slipped, and the big mass rolled from its props and pinned Kinsman helpless. It lay across his stomach. But he did not lose consciousness, and while the men rushed toward him he told them just how to rig up a tackle to remove the weight.

They worked frantically under his directions, for with every instant that passed he was growing feebler. A hurry call had been sent in to the Williamsburg Hospital, and just as Ambulance Surgeon Eckert arrived, the workmen succeeded in getting the foreman from beneath the big mass of metal.

But he only lived a moment after the physician arrived. Every bone in the middle part of his body was crushed. The physician said that the wonder was that he could have kept his senses and lived for the few moments that he did.

Scores U. S. Society Women.

English Writer Can See No Good in Them.

The American society woman is severely criticized by Wilson Young in an article on American characteristics in a current English interview.

"Her life, since most American men are closely occupied with business, is lived almost entirely among women," writes Young. "The American favorites of the harem crowd together in noisy restaurant luncheon parties, chatting endless nonsense at the top of their voices, this being almost their sole distraction, poor things, since for women, no more than for any one else (except for children and servants, who have the liberty to be insolent and inefficient), is there any true liberty in America."

"Just at a moment when women in American Society become mature they cease to live and grow, and remain half children, half dolls. Before marriage they may do as they please; after marriage they surrender both individuality and liberty of thought."
