### Home Lessons.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir.—In perusing your paper on Saturday evening, I was greatly interested in "The Thoughts of Theodora," and one person arrested my attention; I refer to the part dealing with "Home Lessons." Now, I have no children myself, but I am often at friends' houses in the evening, when after tea, the children get out their books, and proceed to "do" their lessons. It has often struck me that these so-called lessons, or home lessons, are a pure farce, they are generally gone through in a slipshod way, and have no real educational value. In a great many cases, the parent have not given him any instruction, and the child, not understanding, I will give an instance: I was at one friend's house one night, and the mother asked her boy if he had done his home lessons, and was told he had not. The mother asked why, and was informed that he did not know how to do it. She asked him what it was, and on getting his books, I was greatly surprised when the boy informed us that he had to draw a map of Australia. Being interested in the lad, I suggested that he should be helped, but found that he had not the least idea of the subject, his teacher at school not having given him any instructions in mapping. So I commenced to try to give him some idea, but found that to proceed along regular lines, it would take pretty well all night. So I advised the boy to frankly tell his teacher in the morning that he was not able to do that particular "lesson," as he had not been taught anything about it. But the boy with that non-querulous British doggedness, set about his task, and managed to draw a fairly good copy (for the first time) of the map of Australia, and I was informed on enquiry later, that he had won special praise from his teacher. In the lesson, in other homes I have been repeatedly appealed to to explain something the children did not understand, and it has been very apparent to me that the school teachers are lax in this respect. I consider that when parents are paying to have their children taught the rudiments of learning, it is not right that they should have to set their children right with their so-called home lessons. When a man (or woman) has done their day's work, they generally are not in a mood to begin to do what they are paying others to do for them. If children have to do lessons at home and the parents to help them, why send the children to school at all? I have noticed but lightly on this subject, and should be pleased to see some one else who has children going to school, give their views on the matter. I might say, in conclusion, that while I went to school, covering a period of nine years, I did not once see a lesson to do at home. We had three teachers in our school, with an average attendance of from two hundred to two hundred and thirty each school day, and although this was in England, I cannot see why the difference in numbers should make any trouble, especially as the average per teacher, seems to be much lower here in Newfoundland.
