The War Week by Week.

In the tremendous fighting on all fronts that characterized the past week, and in the general position at the end of it, we see the effect and culmination of the many months of preparation. At no time before, it may be said, have the prospects of an Allied victory been so bright or the military position so favourable. The difficult problem that confronts the German staff is proof enough of this. It is of which the many points where they are sore beset they may with most effect and safety send the need of reinforcements. And this problem will become increasingly difficult. For this reason, the success of any of the Allied drives is not to be measured by the progress it achieves, but also by advances made possible elsewhere, and the advantage to the Allies' position viewed as a whole.

Perhaps the most significant aspect of the Somme offensive, as it is now known, has been the resumption by the British of their drive forward. For it goes to disprove the theory of critics that the attack is an isolated one, designed merely for the purpose of drawing German forces from other points, and to show that nothing less than a systematic sustained pressure is intended upon the German lines, which will be maintained until these lines break, or it is apparent that they cannot be broken. The lesson of the Champagne has been well learned. An account of this last drive that have reached us seem to agree that the Franco-British forces pushed their infantry attacks to appointed distances and no further, however tempting the chances may have appeared of continuing. The artillery is pounding the way as far as humanly possible; the infantry are not asked or permitted to do much more than complete the work of the artillery. Consequently, most of last week was devoted to the consolidation of the positions won at the outset, and to the repulse of German counter-attacks. Now we may assume that the artillery has been moved, where advance has been made, to new positions, and the bombardment continued with unremitting intensity.

To follow the progress of the British and French troops here a very large scale map is necessary, and even that is of little use unless it

them from lending assistance to the Austrians. We have mentioned before the importance of Kovel, towards which the Russians seem to be making another determined and, so far, successful thrust. Berlin admits retirement at Kamorot and other points in this area, in spite of the heavy reinforcements they were compelled to send there. We thus see three distinct fields of operations in Russia—from Riga southward, of which we have heard nothing definite; from Vilna to Baranovitch, in the middle of the line; and east of Kovel, which is one of the keys of the German position.

In Austria matters are working up to a crisis. If Von Bothmer is unable to make a stand before Stanislaw and this railway centre and Halicz fall in Russian hands, it is hard to see what can save Lemberg. And as the Russians are attacking both from the east and from the south, his task will be a hard one. General Letchinsky's left wing is firmly established, and Cossack cavalry is already reported across the Carpathians into Hungary. This will allow the Russians to strike with full force northward towards Lemberg; the fall of this city will probably not be long delayed. About the only thing that can save it seems to be a German success to the north, which, in view of the pressure on the West front, is not very likely.

Mystery still shrouds the army at Salonika. It is known to be a very large one, easily capable of striking with fatal effect at Bulgaria, isolated as that country now is. Possibly distrust of Greece may still be at the bottom of its inactivity, but there must be other reasons as well. Maybe the attitude of Roumania has something to do with it. But we may be sure that when the favourable moment comes, the Allies will strike from Salonika. If Bulgaria can be disposed of, and Serbia re-established, and if, in addition the co-operation of Roumania can be secured, Austria will be forced by an invasion from still another direction, which she could not possibly have the power to withstand.

In the Supreme Court.

Gallipoli Heroes Return

By the express which reached town on Saturday afternoon, Sergt. Harold Mitchell and Sergt. Stan. Newman, heroes of the Gallipoli campaign, arrived on furlough. Sergt. Mitchell, who was promoted to Lance Corporal at Edinburg and Corporal on board the transport en route to the Dardanelles, received further promotion on the field of battle and is classed as a King's Sergeant. During different sapping operations he performed some good work, whereby he extricated his squad of fifteen men from a dangerous position, his services being recognized by the officer in command. He was stricken with enteric six days before leaving the trenches and eventually reached England, whence he remained in hospital for several months. Sergeant Stan. Newman at the outbreak of hostilities was a non-commissioned officer in the C.L.B., and was among the first to offer his services to the Empire. Leaving here with the first 500, he was all through the Gallipoli war, where, in the thickest of the din of battle, he was knocked out by a piece of shrapnel in the eye. He was afterwards stricken with enteric, and a fair share of the other diseases that were going the rounds of the soldiers. However, thanks to a well-trained constitution he was able to beat them off. Both young soldiers bear witness to the invaluable services rendered the Empire in time of peace by our local Boys' Brigades. Sergt. Mitchell was a member of the Nfld. Highlanders.

Price of Cod Liver Oil Still Dropping.

The price of cod liver oil has been further reduced during the past week, we learn, and there is likely to be a still further decline in the near future. This is on account of the flooding of the market. To-day 35 cents a gallon is offered to fishermen for cod liver by oil manufacturers, a fortnight ago 40 cents per gallon was paid. This year there are twice as many people in the oil refining business locally than heretofore, but, under the existing conditions, as regards the ruling of the price, it is safe to predict that the number of manufacturers will be small next year.
