In addiion to ceding Alsace and Lorraine to her conqueror, France was to pay a war indemnity of 5,000,000,000,000 francs, and continue to be occupied by by German troops until the last franc was handed over.

The sum demanded was as iniquit ous as it was colossal. France could that they scarcely pay it within a score of years. and for that term would be condemned to groan under the heel of her oppressor. #### Nfld. Schr. Sunk by Huns

CREW SAFE.

The public despatches received yeserday announced the sinking of the schr. Percy Roy by a German submarne but nothing further was given. Vesterday afternoon Mr. Calvert Pratt, of the Smith Co., owners of the ll-fated schooner received a messag rom Capt. Dawe stating that his ship vas sunk by a German submaring while en route from Naples to Santa Pola, in Spain, and that the crew wer safe at Palma on the Island of Major

The Percey Roy left here early in November for the European marke and proceeded to Gibraltar from where she was ordered to Naples Having disposed of her cargo, she sailed in ballast for Spain, where she was to load salt for this port, but fellprey to the Germans. The crew, including the captain, numbered six, nost of whom belonged to St. John's. The schooner was 110 tons gross, 99 net and was built in Shelbourne, N.S., in 1903. We also learn that the ship was fully covered by war risk insur-
