By the express yesterday from Port aux Basques Mrs. C. S. James and Miss Pearl James were passengers, both having been spending a time with friends at Chatham.

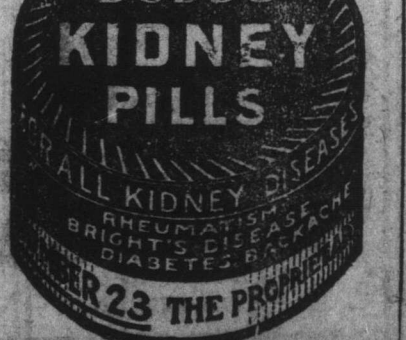
Captain Edward Bishop of Westleyville is in town on business.

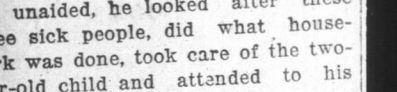
**Three Sick People: a Baby, The Housework and His Patients.**
