The Grenfell Hall in the Seamen's Institute contains a gallery of portraits, including that of His Majesty the King, who is the patron of the Institute and who laid the foundation stone in 1911 by pressing an electric button at Buckingham Palace; also those of Her Majesty the Queen; Her Majesty Queen Alexandra; the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York, both of whom have visited the Institute; the Duke of Cognaught, who officially opened the Girl's Department when here in 1914, Sir Walter Davidson; the late Mrs. Grenfell, mother of Dr. Grenfell, and three former Presidents of the United States, Roosevelt, Taft and Wilson. Dr. Grenfell has just been presented with two new portraits for the Institute which will be hung shortly in the Grenfell Hall. The Duke, when Governor-General of Canada, took the greatest interest in Dr. Grenfell's work on the Labrador, and was one of those who used their influence with the British Admiralty to obtain the gift to the Grenfell Association from the Admiralty of the steamer "Wop" last year. The President's portrait bears an autograph inscription as follows: "To those who made the Seamen's Institute a noble
