By the last English mail Mr. H. F. Shortis received a letter from Sir Edgar Bowring, High Commissioner for Newfoundland, which will have a very real interest for all Newfoundlanders who are proud of and loyal to their native land. Sir Edgar writes:—

"This is to state that I have now received the two banners which were hanging in St. Brigid's Rectory, Jersey. They are so worn and tattered that I am having them covered with netting, which is the usual thing in such cases, before sending them out to Newfoundland. These flags will be of great interest as a memento of the military exploits of the Newfoundland Fenibles in the olden days."

We cordially congratulate Mr. Shortis and the Historical Society on bringing this project to a successful conclusion, and also Sir Edgar Bowring on the good work accomplished.

To Mr. Shortis, however, the public thanks are mainly due. He has been indefatigable in his efforts, instant in season and out of season. To him the initiation of the movement was due, and by him the work has been carried on, in spite of discouragement and criticism. When the banners reach Newfoundland it is to be hoped that some suitable function will celebrate their reception, and that these glorious relics of a by-gone age will inspire a reception worthy of the flag, beneath which the forefathers of some of Newfoundland's gallant sons, who took valiant part in the World's War, marched to the aid of their beloved nation in the days of George III.—Daily News.

The Paseion Play Committee, of Oberammergau, Bavaria, which recently has been bombarded by propaganda from United States moving picture concerns for the privilege of giving the production in 1922, when the play will next be performed, is standing firm in its refusal to play Judas to our tradition, despite our poverty," as it puts it.

The Committee, it is said, has refused offers running as high as seventy million marks, representing a huge fortune to the villagers. Their production of the play every ten years is fulfilment of a vow made back in the seventeenth century thus to express the gratitude of the village for having been spared from a plague. The play, last produced in 1910, was not given in 1920, the regular date, because of the mortality among the performers and musicians caused by the war.

Dear Sir.—Please grant me space in your valuable paper to make a few remarks in regard to voting in our municipal elections. I would in the first instance have respect to all concerned in our Civic affairs, but the injustice to property holders has become so manifest, that I think it is time for some abler pen than mine to take things in hand.

Now, Mr. Editor, can you or any one else show me the justice in not allowing landlords to vote, and having tenants to stand beside you in the voting room in the city, and have the privilege of casting their vote while they owe the landlord house rent for four, five or perhaps as high as twelve months and that poor landlord can't pay his taxes, all on account of the tenant being unable to pay his rent. I know several landlords who are placed in the same position. Can you or any reasonable man or woman, show me a firm on Water Street or any other street that are paying the Council from two to three thousand dollars per year for taxes, and perhaps have only one vote? Can any one show me where a man owes thousands of dollars worth of property in town, and has always paid the Council, but because he lives just outside the city limits is refused a vote, or if so his name is not registered, although his name is in the Council books, and if he owes the Council they will soon find him? Then visit a polling booth and find the list of voters as liberally written that even those

in charge can but imperfectly make out the names.

Now, Mr. Editor, please excuse me for taking so much of your valuable space. I hope that an abler pen than mine will take the matter in hand, and when the business men of the city, with the landlords and property holders speak, it will be with no uncertain sound, and something will be done. Perhaps the Council will be at a loss to know how to handle the matter. Thanking you again, Mr. Editor, for your kindness in inserting these few lines, and hoping some one else will take the matter in hand, and see that something is done to the satisfaction of all concerned.
