LONDON, May 30.—Empire Day was kept with a wealth of pagentry at the British Empire Exhibition.

Someone had the happy idea of mak-

ing May 24 itself a day of Youth. The Duke of Connaught, representing the King, took the salute while ten-colums of boys and girls (Scouts, Guides, and members of various cadet corps), 3,000 in all, marched past the Royal Box at the Stadium. Afterwards we had the Trooping of the Color-the evolution in which the flower of our Army exhibits the perfection of its drill on the King's Birthday-smartly performed by youngsters from two famous naval and military schools. Music was supplied by the largest military band brought together-a housand instrumentalists, including 300 drums and fifes and 100 pipers. These gave a display of their own, marching and counter-marching in the great green arena amid roars of

There was another pageant before the Empire Thanksgiving Services on Sunday May 25, which was attended by the King and Queen, the Princess Wales and several other members the Royal Family, the High Commissioners for all the Dominions and the Agents-General for the Colonies. First the huge massed band was marshalled in the arena. Their Maesties arrived, heralded by the State rumpeters, and a procession began, eaded by detachments of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Metropolitan Police of London. Then came a Guardsman with the Union ack symbolical of Empire, followed standard-bearers with the Dominon flags. Next marched our old riends the "Beef-eaters," or Yeoman Warders of the Tower of London, in their handsome Tudor uniforms, and after them a body of Chelsea pensioners in long scarlet coats-old warriors representing the Army of Yesterday. There were hearty cheers for h old boys, and warmer greetings still for those who followed-a group f disabled soldiers, some still in hosital blue, some blind.

Another procession entered-first the choirs of many churches, then bishops and clergy of all denominations, among whom were the Bishop of London and the Archbishop of Canterbury. Many who were present on both occasions found the ensuing service even more impressive than the eremony at the opening of the Exhibition, a month earlier. No such congregation has assembled before in the history of the world; 100,000 people were actually in the Stadium, and if hose be counted who listened-in withwireless, it may be said that millions
