Purchase of Union Bank of Canada Ratified by Royal Bank Shareholders

French Troops Pouring into the Riff—Tennessee Court Finds Scopes Guilty—Ford's Offer for U.S. Merchantile Fleet Recommended.

SCOPES FOUND GUILTY AND FINED.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 21. John T. Scopes, Dayton school teacher, was found guilty by Rhea County Grand Jury to-day of violating the State law against teaching of evolution, and fined \$100.

BANK MERGER RATIFIED.

MONTREAL, July 21. At a special general meeting of the Royal Bank of Canada held here at 10 o'clock to-day, an agreement to purchase the Union Bank of Canada was unanimously ratified.

THE WEST COHAS FLOATED AND RESUMED VOYAGE.

HALIFAX, July 21. The United States Shipping Board steamer West Cohas, which grounded on Sable Island late on Sunday, while going to the assistance of the French

trawler Labrador, which had grounded early in the day, was floated this morning by the freighter Winona. City and was to-night preparing to resume her voyage from St. John, N.B., to Glasgow, with 550 head of live cattle. The Labrador, which was abandoned yesterday by her crew, was reported a total loss, lying half a mile distant from the scene of the West Cohas stranding. The freighter was apparently undamaged after 36 hours embedded in the sand bar in a heavy sea.

CURZON'S YOUNGEST DAUGHTER WEDS CAVALRY OFFICER.

LONDON, July 21. Before a distinguished gathering in the chapel royal, St. James' Palace, loaned by King George, Lady Alexandra Curzon was married to-day to Major E. D. Metcalfe, of the Indian cavalry. The bride is the youngest

daughter of the late Marquis Curzon, of Kedleston. The Marchioness Curzon gave the bride away and Lord Louis Mountbatten was best man. Queen Elizabeth of Belgium and her daughter, Princess Marie Jose, attended.

FORD'S BID RECOMMENDED.

WASHINGTON, July 21. Acceptance of Henry Ford's bid of \$1,705,000, for two hundred Shipping Board vessels set aside for scrapping, has been recommended to the Shipping Board by President Palmer of the Fleet Corporation.

A PROMINENT SUICIDE.

NEW YORK, July 21. George C. Haven, President of the Metropolitan Opera Company, and prominent in New York banking and financial circles, committed suicide to-day at his home on East Fifty Third Street.

THE RIFFIAN WAR.

ELKRAISH, Spanish Mor., July 21. Advice reaching here from the French zone in Morocco report that arrival of troops from France is going on without interruption. On July 12th there were in Morocco 130,000 soldiers, while at the end of the month it is expected that there will be 200,000 fighting under the French flag. Obligatory conscription under orders of the Sultan of Morocco is expected to bring about 13,000 more effective.

EMPLOYEES' PROPOSITION.

ST. JOHN, N.B., July 21. Employees of James Pender & Co. Ltd., subsidiary of the British Empire Steel Corporation, manufacturing nails and wire here, have presented the management with a resolution expressing willingness to work overtime without pay in order to permit the Company to compete with foreign manufacturers in the export markets. Provision is made that any profits accruing from the export business under the arrangement will be shared between the men and the Company, the former getting 75 per cent., the latter 25 per cent. It is planned for that the men will work three extra hours every other evening.

CASTLE LINER ASHORE.

MANILA, July 21. The British steamer Egremont Castle is aground on Pambata reef in the Sulu Sea and is leaking badly. The vessel grounded because the reef light was not burning. It is feared she will be a total wreck.

CREW LOST WHEN WARSHIP BLOWS UP.

WARSAW, July 21. The Polish torpedo boat Kaszub blew up and sank in Danzig Harbor yesterday. The entire crew was lost.

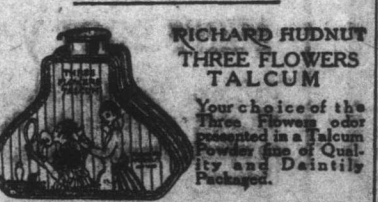
