The Assembly again went into Committee on the Union question. Principal Cavan made an able speech in favour of Union, and was followed by others who spoke for and against it.

The Rev. Mr. King moved that a conference be held with the Synod of the Presbyterian Church, with a view to secure if possible its consent to the removal of the fourth article from the basis, so as to secure Union with the negotiating Churches; it being believed that the object contemplated in this article could be secured in a way more generally acceptable.

In v. T. Wardrope seconded the motion He remarked that they could not each obtain Union upon the terms they wished, and he believed that this resolution would commend itself to their brethren of the Synod in connection with the Church of Scotland.

Principal Cavan moved in amendment that the three first articles of the basis be adopted, and that a conference be held on the fourth. Carried.

A motion was also passed for the withdrawal of the resolution referring to the disposal of the Temporalities Fund of the Presbyterian Church.

In the evening the Home Mission Committee was appointed, with Rev. Mr. Cochrane as Convener.

The Rev. Mr. Vannest of the Reformed Church of America then addressed the Assembly.

The Assembly again went into Committee on the Union Question.

The following resolution was agreed to:—" The Committee expresses general approval of the resolutions, with the exception of those which have already been dealt with."

The following ministers recorded their dissent from the resolutions:—Mr. J. Middlemiss, J. McTavish, J. Ross, J. Scott, J. Ferguson, and Cameron.

Rer. Wm. Reid read the report of Knox College. The contributions to the ordinary fund had amounted to \$7,800, leaving a deficit of \$1,802. The endowment fund now amounted to \$6,612. The contributions to the bursory fund had amounted to \$1,983 which, with a balance from last year, amounted to \$2,074,

contributions to the bursory fund had amounted to \$1,983 which, with a ba'ance from last year, amounted to \$2,074, which had all been expended except \$53. The amount subscribed for the new College building was \$86,159, of which \$22,871 had been already paid. The contracts let amounted to \$73,680, not including several items. It had been found necessary, to meet engagements with contractors, to borrow \$10,000 from the Western Assurance Company on a mortgage on the old building and site. It was expected that the new building would be completed early next year. Rev. W. Reid then read the report of the Board of Management of the Montreal College. They reported the completion of the new College, of which they gave a description. The receipts on account of the building tund had been \$42,522, of which \$33,304 had been paid. The amount expended for the purchase of the ground and building had been \$42,428, which was \$9,324 in excess of the receipts. Considerable expenditure was yet required to pay constanding accounts, enlarging the building, etc. The expenditure for the year had been in excess of the receipts, the balance in hand having been reduced from \$1,112 to \$196.

The day was mainly occupied in receiving reports on the Kankakee Mission, on French evangelization, on the Aged and Infirm Ministers Fund, and on Foreign Missions. The Committee on the first mission recommended that the congregation at St. Annes, Kankakee, be placed under the care of the Presbytery of Chatham, and that Mr. Chiniquy's connection with that mission case.

June 9.

At eleven o'clock the m embers of the Presbyterian Synod were introduced by Rev. Dr. Topp and Rev. Mr. Wardrope. Hon. John McMurrich was chosen to preside at the Conference.

The Clerk of the Synod read the resolutions agreeing to the Union, and congratulatory speeches were made by ministers of both bodies on the gratifying result, and on the unanimity with which the basis of Union was agreed to. The Rev. Mr. McTavish, who was one of the strongest opponents of Union, also spoke, and gave his assent to it. In the evening the Rev. J. H. Wilson and Rev. J. C. Burns, delegates from the Free Church of Scotland, addressed the Assembly,
