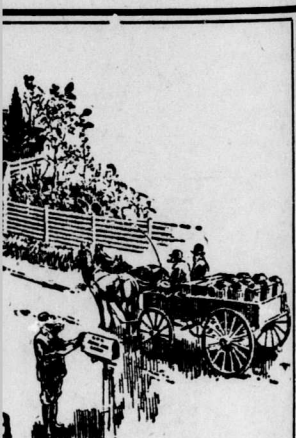

NOTED HORSE BREEDER DIES AT TILSONBURG

Alvin W. Merrill Expires at His Home in His 78th Year.

Tilsonburg, April 29—Alvin D. Merrill, aged 78 years, one of Tilsonburg's eldest citizens, and known all over North America as one of the greatest horsemen of the day, died at the family home on South Broadway Monday afternoon after an illness of several months.

During his lifetime Mr. Merrill raised two world champions in the racing world, Alvin and Patron. Alvin was sold to the Russian government for a big sum, while Patron was sold to an American buyer. For the past twenty years Mr. Merrill seldom missed a race meet in Western Ontario, and was a daily visitor at the local track during the racing season.

Besides his wife, he is survived by one stepson, W. E. Wilcox, at home; one son, Scott, in Toronto; two sisters, Mrs. A. M. Hare, of Tilsonburg; and Mrs. R. C. Scott, of California; and one brother, Leonard, of Toronto.

The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon at the local cemetery, where interment took place.

BRITISH NATION A LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Interesting Lecture on the Empire Given by Prof. Dorland, of Western University

Professor Dorland, of the University of Western Ontario, a specialist in history, gave a most interesting extension lecture in St. Paul's church Tuesday evening, under the auspices of the Young People's League, his subject being "The British Empire." He reviewed the growth of the Empire from the time of the Normans, more particularly describing the political habits of self government of the Anglo Saxons. His review of the development of Canada after the American revolution was most interesting. He described the great change which has taken place during the past twenty-five years. The Empire is developing into a commonwealth of a League of Nations within itself. Each institution or colony is master of its own household, but all are cemented together by allegiance to the one sovereign, Prof. Dorland considers the term Empire now obsolete. The Commonwealth is not an organization for military aggression, or power, nor for commercial monopoly, but for freedom of self government. Within the British Empire are subjects of every known nationality, every race and religion, and yet with this great diversity of thought, Great Britain is the strongest nation in the world. She is a great international experiment and he considered that if the League of Nations at Geneva is to work satisfactorily (and he believed it to be the hope of our civilization to-day), it must work along the same lines in which the British Commonwealth has been established.

Aylmer has enjoyed several of these extension lectures this past winter and our citizens are grateful to the professors of Western University for the inspiration received.

The evening's program was opened with an appropriate solo, "Rule Britannia," by Mr. C. S. Bridgman.
