WIDE WORLD WIRELETS.

Earthquake Shocks in Indiana and Kentucky.

Diphtheria is on the increase in St. Johns, Nfld. The city medical officer died after 24 hours' illness from the disease.

Mount Vernon, Newbury and other Southern Indiana points and several places in Northern Kentucky experienced strong earthquakes Sunday.

Orrington Lunt, of Chicago, has presented to the Northwestern University with \$50,000, the gift to provide a new library building for the university.

The steamer Marica, and the Helena collided near Salt Ste. Marie on Friday. The Helena sank in a few minutes and the Russian ship named Marica was driven ashore.

Rev. John Amable Tremblay, of the Sulpician Seminary, Montreal, died Saturday morning after a long illness. He was native of France, aged 50 years, and came to this country some fifteen years ago.

Four-hundred halibut were taken in Orillia (Ont.) Thursday afternoon. Grain and fruit suffered terribly. The asylum building had 400 lights broken and many residences and greenhouses lost heavily by the smashing of windows.

On Friday night rocks at Ottawa, Ont., were put upon the electric railway track. The cars smashed into them and the motor was badly damaged. The spot where the outrage was perpetrated was so dark the obstruction could not be seen.
