# The Gold Medal Nothing but War

London Press Urges Prompt Action by the Government.

The Boers Massing Artillery at Laing's Neck.

A Raid Anticipated-No British Cabi-

net Council Called as Yet.

London, Sept. 19 .- There is an unverified Cape Town rumor today that the Boers have delivered another message to the British high commissioner, Sir Alfred Milner, more conciliatory than yesterday's reply. The rumor, however, fails to obtain much credence, and is not taken as in any way mitigat-

ing the seriousness of the crisis. The outlander press sees nothing but war ahead, and urges the outlanders to leave immediately. The general impression is that the Boers will at once take the initiative and an attack is expected at any hour.

for Kimberley and the north. The first-class cruiser Terrible, sailing from Portsmouth for China today, proved to have been ordered to go by way of Cape Town instead of Suez. Nothing is yet known regarding the definite date of the expected cabinet meeting.

PROMPT ACTION URGED. The London press is now inclined to take the view that the recent action on the part of the Boers does not make war a certainty, as cabled to the Associated Press, Sept. 16, though it does place the British cabinet in a position where it must take steps so aggressive that war or utter ignominious sucmission will be the only alternatives remaining to the Transvaal, and it is by no means lacking in urging the government to move hastily, except in the matter of hurrying troops to the pro-

bable scene of action. TELEGRAPH WIRES KEPT HOT. Mr. Chamberlain spent last evening at the colonial office. While there he received a dispatch from Lord Salisbury who is at Hatfield, and sent a special messenger with dispatches to the premier. There has been a large amount of dispatches between the foreign, war and colonial offices, but no summons has yet been issued for the cabinet council. Long dispatches were sent to the Viceroy of India, Lord Curzon of Kedleston, and to the British high commissioner in South Africa, Sir Alfred Milner.

EXCITEMENT RUNS HIGH. War risks on the greater part of transportation to the Transvaal were counted at an increase of 50 per cent, and excitement is running high.

The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "It is reported that Mr. Conyngham Greene, British agent at Pretoria, fears that an at-tempt will be made to dynamite the British agency."

BOERS BUSY. The special dispatch from South Africa confirm the reports telegraphed yesterday that the Boers are massing artillery in positions commanding Laing's Neck. Small Boer detach-ments occupy positions about Buffalo

The members of the Afrikander bund in Cape Town intend to convene the bund in congress. A Bloemfontein paper reports the dismissal of several Englishmen from the Bloemfontein police because of their refusal to promise to serve on the command.

ORANGE FREE STATE. The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "The Afrikander bund circle claim to have intervened between Great Britain and the Trans-vaal. Sir Alfred Milner, in reply to a correspondent, who had requested information regarding the position of British subjects in the Orange Free State in the event of hostilities, has replied that he is unaware of any relations between the imperial government and the Orange Free State which would justify hostile action on the latter's part, and expressed the opinion that it would be equally contrary to national law to order out British subjects against the Queen's soldiers. This is a most opportune pronouncement, as the Orange Free State proposes commanding British subjects to guard the Basutoland border.

MORE DIFFICULTIES. The Daily Telegraph publishes a communication from a military correspondent, who, discussing the effect of the Free State throwing its lot in with the Transvaal, says: "In the event of war this will greatly increase our difficul-ties and will lengthen the duration of the compaign, but the work will be accomplished and the Union Jack will float over consolidated South Africa between the Zambesi and the Cape. The principal danger which besets the British position is a sudden outbreak-ing enabling the Boers to secure a few minor successes, which would bring down upon us every Dutchman in South Africa, and probably the statement that the Boers are sending compressed forage to the Natal border

It is said that Dreyfus will be sent abroad before the promulgation of his pardon, in order to avoid demonstra-

Paris, Sept. 19.—The announcement that Dreyfus was to be pardoned had already been discounted by predictions, and there was absolutely no excite-ment displayed anywhere along the boulevards when the newsboys ran along at about 3:15 p.m. with the first editions containing the statement that the cabinet had decided to pardon Dreyfus. DEATH OF DREYFUS' CHAMPION. M. Schuerer-Kestner, the former vice-president of the senate and champion of Dreyfus, is dead.

M. Auguste Schuerer-Kestner, the former vice-president of the French Senate and great champion of the cause of Dreyfus, was born Feb. 1, 1833, at Mulhouse, Alsace, from which place the Dreyfus family also hailed. He was president of the Chemical Society of Paris, and was a prominent member of a number of old societies. He was elected director of the Republique Francaise from 1879 to 1884, and was a Republican in politics. He took a great interest in the improvement of the working classes, and in 1865 founded 1865 founded a co-operative society for their benefit. His Republican ideas, in 1867, caused him to be sentenced to four months' imprisonment and 2,000 francs fine. He was elected to the National Assembly in 1871, and in 1875 he was first elected to the senate, of which he afterwards became one of the secretaries and eventually one of the vice-presidents. He was defeated for re-election as vice-president Jan. 13, 1898. He has written extensive-
