LIOUOR REVENUES

Over Three Hundred Thousand Dollars Collected Last Year.

Toronto, March 12.-There was an increase of 313 in the number of commitments for drunkenness in this Province last year, according to the annual report of the inspection of liquor licenses For 1903 there were 2,987 commitments as compared with 2,674 in 1902. There were in the Province 3,023 licenses of all kinds. as compared with 3,014 in 1902. The revenue derived from licenses and fines was \$304,780, as compared with \$301,369 in 1902. The total collections for licenses and fines and sums imposed by municipal bylaws were \$644,095, as compared with \$627,852 in 1902. The revenue to the municipalities was \$250,229, as compared with \$245,477 in 1902. The fines collected were \$16,595, as compared with \$11,876 in 1902. The expenses of commissioners, etc., were \$67,539, as compared with \$65,039 the preceding year.
