"That James Lamplough came to his death on the night of Aug. 2 by falling from a Southwestern Traction car, near Tempo, and sustaining a severe injury to the skull. We exonerate both the conductor and motorman from any blame. The jury is of the opinion that legislation should be enacted to prevent the overcrowding of cars and to prevent passengers from standing or sitting on the steps while cars are in motion. The jury also recommend that precaution should be exercised in the erection of station platforms."


