### UNION ORGANIZER

#### ATTACKS S. ARMY

Says Latter Spreads Misleading  
Information About the  
Dominion.

Fort William, Sept. 13.—In his an-  
nual report to the Trades and Labor  
Congress of Canada, W. R. Trotter,  
general organizer, refers to the Sal-  
vation Army's activity in bringing la-  
borers to this country as "one of Can-  
ada's greatest menaces."

The report asserts that for immigra-  
tion purposes the Salvation Army cir-  
culates among the laboring classes  
throughout England grossly mislead-  
ing literature concerning opportunities  
in Canada.

On the recommendation of the  
executive committee a resolution was  
passed expressing sincere regret at  
the death of the late Goldwin Smith,  
and appreciation of his earnest efforts  
to uplift and benefit the masses of the  
people.

Several resolutions were discussed  
today, including indorsement of act to  
compel weekly pay, shorter hours for  
postmen and lighter uniforms for sum-  
mer wear, abolition of home work in  
tailor shops and taxation of land  
values. Two important matters to  
come up are the organization of pro-  
vincial labor federations and a resolu-

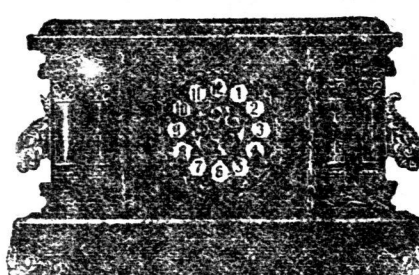

Inspector J. F. Oldfield, assisted by  
central office detectives, after a pur-  
suit extending from Buffalo to Cleve-  
land, Chicago, Duluth, Detroit, and  
finally to New York. The men ar-  
rested, it is stated, are members of  
the Marine Firemen and Marine  
Cooks' Associations.

It was on June 26 that Fraser ar-  
rived with his vessel at Buffalo from  
Sault Ste. Marie. The lake carrying  
trade was on the threshold of a big  
maritime strike. Fraser, sailor-like,  
dropped into a saloon. There he fell  
in with a crowd of striking sailors,  
who, Fraser claims, drugged and rob-  
bed him. He was then carried into a  
factory yard near by, assaulted and  
left unconscious. When picked up by  
the police his ear was gone, and over  
his right eye was pasted a printed  
label warning men not to take non-  
union jobs while the strike was on.  
The police made a fruitless search for  
his assailants.

Meanwhile the federal authorities in  
Washington received a letter sent to  
the Cleveland shipper, accompanied by  
Fraser's missing ear, preserved in al-  
cohol, and sent through the mails.

Written across the face of the let-  
ter in red ink was the word "Death,"  
the text apparently composed by an  
illiterate person, read.

"Mister Coulbey you're hart will be  
next. You killed Broter Italiano. This  
is one of yours men's ears. We will  
get no matter where you go."

This letter brought postoffice in-  
spectors into the case, and tonight  
they ran down the men they say com-  
mitted the crime. The men under ar-  
rest denied their guilt, but admitted  
they were sailors from the great lakes.
