HAY SOLD AT \$16 ON LOCAL MARKET TODAY

Butter Prices Active—Dressed and Live Poultry in Demand.

A fairly active market was in evidence today. Hay sold as high as six and one-half cents per ton, and one and one-half loads sold at \$1.35 per cwt. Butter was active at 22 cents per pound. Live poultry was in demand at 22 cents per dozen.

On the fruit market consignments were sold early in the day. Peaches sold from 75 cents to \$1 per basket, according to quality, plums from 50 cents to 75 cents, and grapes, 45 to 60 cents per basket.

Vegetables were fairly plentiful and sold at unchanged prices. Dressed and live poultry were in demand. Meat prices were steady. Other market prices held firm.

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BIDS BABES FAREWELL BEFORE GOING TO CELL

Mrs. Neopolitana Leaves the
for Life Term at Kingston.

Bault Ste. Marie, Ont., Aug. 28.—Mrs. Neopolitana, who was sentenced to die Aug. 9, but who through the efforts of the women of Canada was spared to spend her life in prison, was removed from the district jail at midnight last night, and placed on board a steamer en route to Kingston Penitentiary. There was an affecting scene during the morning, when the baby, for the birth the execution had been delayed, was taken from her to be placed in care of the children's Aid Society, who has the custody of all of the other children. Before leaving she took an affectionate farewell of all her children, and with tears in her eyes made a last look at the mother who was waiting to convey her to the steamer. Her identity was not disclosed, and the other passengers were told that the little Italian woman was.
