The middle book of the Bible is Micah; the middle and smallest chapter is the 11th Psalm; the middle verse is the eighth verse of the 118th Psalm; Psalms is also the largest book of the Bible, and the largest chapter is the 119th Psalm; the twenty-first verse of the seventh chapter of Ezra contains all the letters of the alphabet.

The smallest chapter of the Bible is the thirty-fifth verse of the eleventh chapter of St. John.

"I direct judgment for the defendant without costs."

Mrs. Primrose, in her suit, alleged that her husband had been cruel and inhuman and that he had abandoned her. Primrose denied her allegations and made counter charges of cruelty.

Mrs. Primrose contended that her husband's income was at least \$25,000 a year, but he claimed this was a gross exaggeration.

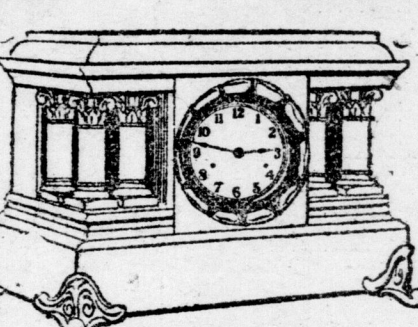
