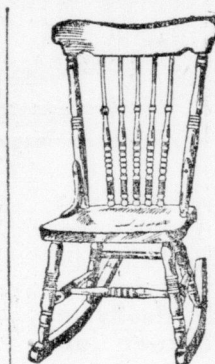

## CANADIANS HAVE ASCENDANCY IN NO MAN'S LAND

Dominate Positions in Front  
of Germans.

### FOE'S GUNS ARE SILENCED

Bombardment by the Enemy  
Brings Forth Vigorous  
Response.

[Canadian Press.]

OTTAWA, July 14.—Major-General Sir Sam Hughes has received the following communique from the Canadian general representative at the front:

Canadian Corps Headquarters in France, via London, July 14.—There was a noticeable diminution in the volume of hostile artillery during the last few days on the Canadian front. Only one severe bombardment was directed upon our positions. Starting at 7:30 in the evening it continued until 10 with exceptional violence. Our heavy and field batteries responded with the greatest vigor, and under the concentrated weight of their fire, the hostile guns were eventually silenced.

Our artillery on many occasions shell the Germans lines. Enemy machine gun emplacements, observation posts and strong points were damaged, and in some instances destroyed. Numerous hostile working parties were also dispersed.

Control No Man's Land.

Our battalions in the front lines displayed particular activity. A daily toll of victims was claimed by our snipers. By night and by day our machine guns harassed the enemy and hampered his efforts to strengthen his defences. The size and number of our patrols was increased and an unquestionable ascendancy established over No Man's Land.

One night a French-Canadian patrol under Scout Sgt. Pouliot and Corp. Lagelle was returning from an inspection of the German entanglements, when it encountered an enemy party of equal size. Simultaneously bombs were thrown by both sides. Led by their sergeant, our men rushed at the enemy. The foremost two of the Germans were seized and overpowered, while the remainder of the hostile party rapidly withdrew, carrying with it a wounded man. One of the prisoners taken was a corporal wearing the iron cross. On a former occasion Scout Sgt. Pouliot greatly distinguished himself by his courage and enterprise.

Two other French-Canadian patrols had encountered with the enemy. In both instances the Germans were driven back and suffered casualties.

Scattered by Machine Gun.

Another night scouts of a Calgary battalion located an enemy working party of about 150 men in the open. Work was carried back to our trenches

## BIG NAVAL COLLIER BELONGING TO U. S. SINKS IN ATLANTIC

Fate of 142 Men Aboard Is  
Not Known.

### DISABLED IN A STORM

Goes Down While Attempting  
To Put Into Port at  
Charleston.

CHARLESTON, S.C., July 14.—The big naval collier Hector, carrying 60 marines in addition to her crew of 70 men and 12 officers, sank off Charleston Lightship late today, according to a report tonight from Captain Hunt of the tug Vigilant, which tried to go to the Hector's assistance.

CREW REPORTED SAFE.

CHARLESTON, S.C., July 14.—Officials at the navy yard here late tonight announced that the crew of the naval collier Hector, reported sunk off here, had been taken off in small boats. A wireless message, it was said, had been sent out asking all vessels to watch for the boats.

## JOHN REDMOND REPEATS CHARGE AGAINST LANSLOWNE

Demands Prompt Production of the  
New Irish Bill.

LONDON, July 14.—John Redmond, leader of the Irish Nationalists, today again took up his charge against the Marquis of Lansdowne in another statement, in which he demands the prompt production of the new Irish bill in order to settle the disputed points between himself and Lord Lansdowne. The Irish leader in his statement says:

"With regard to the declaration of Lord Lansdowne in his speech of a policy of naked coercion in Ireland, I am loath to believe that it represents a deliberate decision of the cabinet, but I repeat that such a policy can meet with nothing but repudiation, condemnation and opposition on the part of the Irish party."

PARADE IN HONOR OF FRANCE.

CALGARY, July 14.—In honor of the national holiday of the French republic, some eight thousand troops from their neighboring Sarcee camp, marched through the city this afternoon in review order.

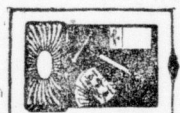
Brig.-Gen. A. E. Cruikshank, officer commanding military district No. 23, took the salute from a platform in front of the city hall.

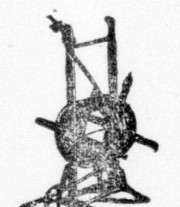

## RESIGNS AS SECRETARY OF WINNIPEG BOARD

Dr. C. N. Bell Is Succeeded by A. E. Boyle.

WINNIPEG, July 14.—After twenty-eight years' service, the resignation of Dr. C. N. Bell, secretary of the Winnipeg Board of Trade, was accepted with regret at a special meeting of the executive today.

A. E. Boyle was appointed as the new secretary. Mr. Boyle is well known in both Ontario and Western Canada, being a graduate of Toronto University and serving his newspaper novitiate at Niagara Falls, and being successively reporter on the Toronto Globe and commercial editor of the Toronto News before coming west in 1905, when for a time he was editor of the Regina Standard, and later publicity commissioner for that city. For four years he was western representative of the Toronto Globe, and more recently has been engaged in the Dominion Government's case in the matter of telegraph rates.

## TORONTO RAISES \$25,000 FOR VERDUN REFUGEES

Tag Day Benefit Nets Good Sum for  
French Sufferers.

TORONTO, July 14.—Toronto's tag day for the benefit of the Verdun refugees today netted, with three districts yet to hear from, the sum of \$24,360, thus assuring the \$25,000 aimed at by the workers.

UP LAKES FROM PORTO RICO.

TOLEDO, Ohio, July 14.—Flying the British flag, the steamer Honoreva arrived here today from Porto Rico, light. Under charter to the Valley Camp Coal Company of Cleveland she is loading coal for the Canadian Soo and will proceed from there to Chicago to load meat for the Allies.
