Reflex influence

"All your trouble will come back to you in a finer golf. And let me say that in Miss Helen Baker some day most probably you will have an enviable champion."

Mrs. E. B. Smith opened the proceedings with a few words to the assembled players and spectators, complimenting the Ontario players on their splendid spirit of sportsmanship, and specially mentioning the Ontario leading golfers through whom there has been a great advance in golf in the country.

## SOMEBODY'S TRUNKS IN POLICE STATION

## PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT WOULD CUT EXPENSES

Thinks Soldiers' Aid Commission is Costing Too Much.

The main subject under discussion at the executive meeting of the soldiers' aid commission, which was held in the committee clubrooms Friday afternoon, was "Child Welfare Work and its Relation to the Soldiers' Aid Commission."

The provincial secretary, J. Warwick and J. R. Stevenson of the Child Welfare Work Association, Toronto, were among those present. It was pointed out at the meeting that reports from the provincial government say that the expense of the S.A.C. are as great now, if not greater than they were three years ago when the war was on, and must be curtailed, as they can see no reason why the returned soldiers should not be fitted for civil work by now.

The children's welfare department expenses are all kept up by the provincial government and not locally. Mr. Loman, of the head office of the child welfare work in Toronto, has been appointed to London district, and will probably take over this work from the S. A. C., which has been looking after it, as well as all other work under its jurisdiction until now. No action has as yet been taken regarding this matter, however, but it will probably be taken up at the conclusion of the meeting this afternoon.

The welfare association is very similar to the Children's Aid Society, in that it provides suitable foster homes for neglected youngsters and sees that all deserving cases are looked after.

The welfare committee also pointed out that there was several families of immigrants, as well as neglected and deserted soldiers' wives to be looked after, but this will probably be discussed at the meeting today.

## FRENCH NAVAL PROGRAM CALLS FOR 66 NEW SHIPS

Naval Commission's Report Approved by Large Majority in Chamber.

PARIS, June 10.—The Chamber of Deputies today adopted the naval program presented Thursday by Deputy Paul Denise, reporter for the naval commission, by 485 to 125.

The program for the construction of six light cruisers, twelve destroyers, twelve torpedo-boats, the largest submarine, at an approximate cost of 1,416,000,000 francs.
