War Memorial Hospital Committee Reports Work well Advanced For Opening.

Names Representatives To Assist in Preparing Program For Oct. 28.

"At last!"

Here and there in the clubroom of the King street Y. W. C. A. the whisper was heard on Friday afternoon, when the point was reached in the proceedings of the October meeting of the War Memorial Hospital committee for the convenor, Mrs. Arthur H. Smith, to announce: "And now we have come to the time to make plans for the opening of the hospital."

Committee members who had been all through the grand campaign from the very beginning settled back in their chairs with contented smiles on their faces. Three years before the War Memorial Children's Hospital was just a great idea. Friday afternoon the work had progressed to the point where the committee endorsed china, decorated with red poppies, in echo of Flanders, and nursery rhyme songs. Mrs. H. J. Sutherland, convenor of the sewing committee of the War Memorial Hospital, I. O. D. E., announced that already enough linen supplies have been finished with which to open the hospital.

Since no answer has been yet received from Gen. Sir Arthur Currie, president of the War Memorial Hospital, I. O. D. E., and the Canadian overseas forces, to the invitation to officiate at the opening on Oct. 28, it was decided to send him a night letter.

Name Program Committee. Five members of the hospital committee, with the convenor, Mrs. A. H. Smith, were named to co-operate with five members of the Municipal Chapter, I. O. D. E., and the hospital trust, in arranging the opening day program. Linen Ready for Opening. Mrs. H. J. Sutherland reported that the splendid total of 2,500 articles had been completed in the way of linen and garments for the little patients, and 2,050 articles had been cut and given out to be made up since May.

Warm tributes were paid the sewing committee by the convenor, and other members of the hospital committee. On motion of Mrs. J. S. Niven it was decided to make all plates to be used in connection with endowments of uniform size. While the hospital committee has made arrangements to pay for the plates, it was recorded that if any organizations making endowment wished to pay for their own this would be most acceptable.

In addition to the provincial president, Mrs. Arthur H. Smith, and the provincial secretary-treasurer, Mrs. F. J. Greenaway, London will be represented next Monday at the annual convention of Ontario United Hospital Aides by Mrs. Niven and Mrs. Routledge.

A letter was read from Gen. W. B. King, G.O.C., consenting to act on the hospital committee and advisory board, and also one from Mr. James Gray, stating he would be pleased to act on the building committee. The name of Miss Emery was added to the hospital committee. Mrs. E. H. Young reported that the Princess Mary wedding gift fund to endow a cot had reached \$671. It was voted to add to this the balance from the Scots Guards band concert, and also the proceeds from the musical held this week in the home

## AUTHORESS-JUDGE IS COMING TO TOWN

Judge Murphy, Alias Janey Canuck, To Address Women's Canadian Club Monday.

Janey Canuck is coming to town, and all the chapters, clubs, or whatever the organization may be that have taken the name of this gifted Canadian woman, are looking forward with eager interest to perceiving, obtaining a glimpse of her.

Under the more sedate name of Judge Emily Murphy, or Mrs. Arthur Murphy of Edmonton, she is going to address the Women's Canadian Club on Monday afternoon at 4:15 o'clock, in the Central Collegiate Auditorium.

After angling for years in order to capture the club, a visit from this distinguished woman, a telephone message to the home of her sister, Mrs. Ferguson Burke in Toronto, on Thursday evening brought about the happy results.

Whatever she talks about is bound to be interesting and informing, as everybody knows who has read her breezy books of past years, during which she has gone back, back, back to discover the causes of crime with which she is daily confronted as a woman magistrate in Edmonton. The drug traffic has had good cause to tremble at the beginning of the week, and it is due to her efforts in this connection that she is very much in the public eye just at the present moment.

Though her mission in life is to eradicate and not encourage crime, Janey Canuck has as many aliases as an international crook.

Under the name of "Emily Ferguson," her very own maiden name, she gave to the world her first impressions of the Canadian west, when a dozen or so more years ago she trekked towards the land of wheat and promise, with the family "padre," and her two young daughters. Even going up on the boat to Port Arthur, she called to see nothing when sailing but the dining-table and the engine because of the pistons, wheels, belts and shafts that strain, sweat and growl under driving steam, possessed such a fascination for her, offered such endless mystery to be solved.

Her interest in knowing "what makes the wheels go round" has caused her to delve far under the surface of things-as-They-Appear in the building of national life, or in the police of juvenile court proceedings, and this is why her discoveries have been regarded as worthy while, and thinking people have come to look upon her statements as authoritative.

And still Janey Canuck manages to keep amusing, as humorous as the day she echoed the sentiments of Gail Hamilton, "I thought I was a Christian, but we've been moving."

Immediately after her arrival in London she will be carried off for luncheon by members of the Women's Press Club, who consider they have very first claim upon her. Not only is Janey Canuck a writer of books, and a journalist who manages to sell her articles. For seven whole years she was president of the Canadian Women's Press Club, and during all the long war years and the readjustment time when the triennial meeting of women scribes was quite unthinkable.

Coming to Western Ontario she is coming back home, coming back to the garden spot of Canada, where her girlhood and early married years were spent. Coming to London she will be welcomed by many old friends, who are proud of the fact. She is a Canadian woman, and she has been mentioned many quarters for the Canadian Senate.

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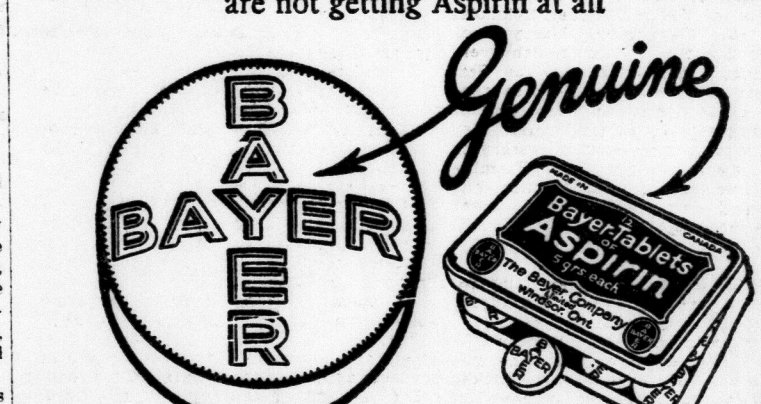
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
