# **\$160,000,000** Increase IN DOMINION'S TRADE

Both Imports and Exports
Larger Than Same Period
Last Year.

Ottawa, Sept. 19.—There was nearly \$160,000,000 increase in the total trade of Canada for the first five months of the current fiscal year, acmorphism to a return made public today by the department of customs. The betterment was larger in imports than in exports, but was great in both.

The total trade of the Dominion according to this return, for the five months ending with August, was \$785.000,000, as against \$626,000,000 Pan-American ... months ending with August, was \$785.000,000, as against \$626,000,000 during the same perfod a year ago, the exact increase being something over \$159,000,000. Imports during the feriod were about \$393,000,000, as against \$303,000,000 a year ago; while exports of Canadian produce rose from \$316,000,000 approximately to \$386,000,000. The trade in foreign merchandise exported showed an increase also, but only to a slight degree.
