SAYS "GRIP" GERM CAUSES INFLUENZA

Famous London Physician Hopes Serum Treatment Will Effect Cure.

LONDON, July 29 .- That influenza s predominantly a germ disease, which can possibly be cured by serum treatment, is the conclusion reached by Dr. James McIntosh, of London, after a lengthy study of the great epidemic of 1918-19, made for the medical research council.

The results obtained by Dr. Mc-Intosh, a report of which today was published, are offered very tentatively. Dr. McIntosh is careful to make no positive claims. Indeed.

MONTREAL, July 28.—According to those who are reputable authorities on the subject, over five hundred ounces of narcotic drugs are being smuggled into Montreal every day, a quantity

The traffic in drugs recently assumed such alarming proportions that local authorities found themselves unable to adequately cope with the situation under existing regulations concerning the pen-




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
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
