Premier of Canada,
Ottawa, Ont.
Right Honorable Sir, — Following is a resolution bearing the unanimous indorsement of the members of the Progressive Ratepayers' Association of Highland and Manor Park, London, Ont., concerning a national asset, Alberta coal.

Whereas, we firmly believe that the hour has struck when the government of this dominion should take action regarding transportation and ways and means of placing Alberta coal on the market in this province of Ontario.

Whereas, it is our unanimous cpinion that Alberta coal can be shipped to Ontario at a freight rate, that would allow its use at a price that would favorably compete with the American product, and
Whereas, eminent authorities on transportation problems have expended to London bill, Ald. Drake insists.
