Chicago, April 10.—Influenced by the government crop report, the market for grain today was unsettled. According to one authoritative source, the government report could suggest a production of 700,000 bushels an amount 75,000 bushels over the "chance" figure of yesterday. Opening prices were steady, but the market was moved down by slight additional sagging receipts and scattered selling. The market closed with prices ending unchanged to 1/4c of the day. It is understood moderate gains in the spring wheat market.
