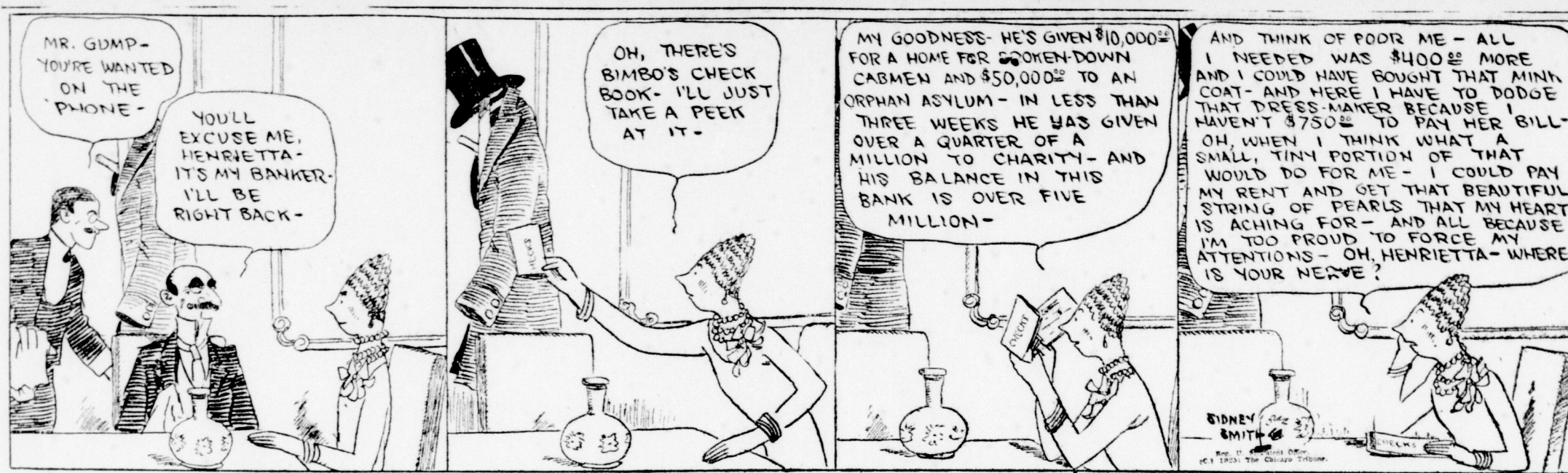

ANDREW PEPPALL AGAIN ARRESTED

Held by U. S. Police For Extradition at Ontario's Request.

MOVE BY NICKLE

Canadian Press Despatch.
Toronto, Jan. 25.—Andrew Peppall, one-time business associate of Peter Smith, former treasurer of Ontario, and now serving a three-year term in Portsmouth for conspiracy in connection with the Ontario government bond scandal, has been arrested for the second time at Los Angeles by United States officials at the instigation of the attorney-general of Ontario. He is held on an extradition warrant which charges him with the embezzlement of \$268,000 for hearing on Feb. 11, and has been refused bail. He had only lately escaped deportation to Canada for alleged illegal entry into the United States.

Connected With Smith.
Attorney-General Nickle stated tonight that the extradition proceedings represent another effort of the Ontario government to bring Peppall to justice for alleged participation in the bond scandals. The proceedings are based on charges of theft and bribery, and name Peppall as the third member of a triumvirate who trafficked in the bonds at the expense of the province. Amelius Jarvis, undergoing a six months' sentence at the jail farm near this city, and Peter Smith are the two others.

Other charges against Peppall are in contemplation, and it is probable that if the extradition proceedings are successful upwards of six criminals will be added to the list.

Howard Carter Resumes Work As Tomb of King Tut Reopened

London, Jan. 25.—A despatch from Luxor, Egypt, says the tomb of "King Tut" was reopened today in the presence of government officials. The contents of the tomb taken out last year were handed over to Howard Carter, the Egyptologist. Mr. Carter found everything that had been sealed, when the tomb was closed, remained intact. The priceless pall of the Sarcophagus, which had been left outside the tomb in a thin wooden shed, however, had deteriorated, probably beyond repair.

THIRTY MEN MISSING AS STORM HITS COAST

Wind Drives Fishing Boats Into Sea—Two Known Dead.

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 25.—Thirty men belonging to Roseblanche are missing as the result of a sudden storm which swept them to sea. In their fishing boats last evening. One boat, the Annie Hannum, lost her master, Captain Hannum, and another man, Joseph Hayward, aged 23 and unmarried, who was knocked overboard by the boom.

FOREST CITY SURGEON CALLED TO NEW YORK

Dr. William Mace Will Act As Witness in Damage Suit.

Dr. William Mace, one of London's youngest surgeons, was signally honored when he was summoned to attend the supreme court sitting at New York as an expert witness.

The Third Avenue Street Railway line, New York City, is the defendant in a \$100,000 damage action, and subpoenaed the local man to appear on the behalf of the railway. Dr. Mace left for New York Sunday, and as the court sessions are already on, expects to return by the middle of the week.

WORLD IS FACING WHEAT SHORTAGE

1924 Crop Was 373,000 Bushels Below Previous Year.

Montreal, Jan. 25.—The world's wheat crop of 1924 was 373,000,000 bushels less than in 1923, according to figures supplied by the International Institute of Agriculture. A serious shortage of wheat and rye is threatened during the last half of the cereal year, according to a statement issued today by the Department of Agriculture.

"From the latest official data," says the report "including Canada's reduced total, the world's wheat shortage is 373,000,000 bushels. By continents, the shortages are Europe 178,484,000 bushels; North America 124,500,000; Asia 11,900,000; Africa 28,856,000; South America 61,571,000; a total of 412,311,000 bushels is to be deducted an increase in Australia of 39,248,000.

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GERMANY GETS REPLY TO COLOGNE PROTEST
