Provisions for obtaining the funds took the form of "legislation" authorizing a bond issue of \$8,500.

While the boys' parliament in proposing to raise money by an issue of bonds follows the plans of parliaments proper, its securities will be distinguished from other government issues by the fact that they will have no cash redemption value. The bonds will be similar to those issued during the last year, which invite the

The marketing of the bonds is to be handled by the boys themseives during the period between Jan. 31 and Feb. 10. A plan of awards has been worked out, whereby prizes will be given to the boys who are most successful in disposing of the issue.




