# STORM'S CASUALTIES MOUNT AS LATEST REPORTS ARRIVE FROM STRICKEN MID-WEST

Estimate of Dead in Tornado-Swept Sections Placed at Over One Thousand.

INJURED NEARLY 3,000

Fire in Wake of Tornado Adds to Horrors of Prostrated Districts.

TOWNS OBLITERATED

Human Lives Snuffed Out in Twinkling as Twister Hits Without Warning.

With the stricken towns almost completely isolated, definite reports as to general loss of life were lacking, but estimates placed the number well above the one thousand mark, with many more injured. The amount of property damage also lacked definite figures, but was sev eral million dollars,

Smoke still poured from the debris of Murphysboro's smoldering ruins. while its citizens searched for the dead early today. The main business section was virtually wrecked, and L. streets were filled with poles and debris and wrecked automobiles.

## City Saved from Tornado By Geographical Position

disastrous tornado which ravaged the central states to the south struck London early this morning. The geographical position of Western Ontario saved the district from suffering the fate of a dozen towns across the border.

London is just on the dividing line between the tropical regions and the polar circle. Storms originating in the torrid south gather in violence until they reach a point to the south of the lakes. There they are met by a cooling force of the northern temperatures. They decrease in strength as they sweep this

This is the opinion of Dr. R. C. Dearle of the department of physics, University of Western Ontario. He says that the low pressure areas of the south start the destroying tornadoes northward. If the low pressure had continued the tornado would have increased in intensity until it reached here.

According to the barometer at the university, the night was vorse here than it seemed. Between 7 o'clock last night and 5 o'clock this morning a drop of six-sevenths of an inch was registered. It was a bad night. The barometer has since showed a rise. Up to 11:30 this morning it had moved up half an inch.

The pressure of Lake Erie to the south would not have a noticeable modifying effect on such a storm, says Dr. Dearle, who says that in local cases it might have a tendency to annul the force. A continental disturbance covering a vast expanse of territory would sweep across the lakes until it met the contrary forces of the northern areas.


