SOME BRANCHES MADE MONEY

Maritime U. F. Co-operative Stores Up Against Hard Times.

Fredericton, March 31.—The Corporation Committee met this morning, with Mr. Robitson in the chair, and after having asked the blessing of the Lord, the committee proceeded to consider the acts relating to the Victorian Order of Nurses which was reported with amendments.

A bill to provide for the reorganization of the Maritime United Farmers' Co-operative, Limited, was considered. J. G. Kirkpatrick, Fredericton, auditor of the company, gave details of the business of the organization. W. P. Jones, K.C., Woodstock, solicitor, appeared also. It was explained that the object of the bill was to segregate the various branches of the organization and make each an independent business. Twenty-six branches existed in New Brunswick and in Nova Scotia.

Of the capital stock there had been \$405,000 subscribed out of a total authorized of \$1,000,000. The amount paid up had been \$305,000. Liabilities were totalled at \$393,000, of which \$125,000 had been paid off liabilities. Assets were valued at \$516,000. The branches had refused to pay the balance on the subscribed stock when head office called for it, and as a result a reorganization was to be attempted.

Hon. Mr. Michael asked a number of questions which were answered by Mr. Kirkpatrick and Mr. Jones. Mr. Kirkpatrick explained that the business of the last year had been a success and dividends had been paid in proportion to the amount of stock paid up. There were no profits last year but loss of \$146,000. Some branches had made money and had paid in to head office during the last year. The weak branches had been carried along.

Hon. Mr. Foster said he presumed that some of the profits went to meet expenses of an election. Mr. Kirkpatrick read the following list of branches which had made profits during 1921, and the amounts: Havelock, \$1,321; Woodstock \$2,244; Truro, \$742; Windsor, \$239; Telamon, \$1,546; Pictou de Bute, \$1,223; Albert, \$60,29; Sussex, \$1,602; Millville, \$1,721; Lower Southampton,

Hon. Mr. Veniot asked how the head office lost, and the reply of Mr. Kirkpatrick was that business was centralized there and there had been depreciation because of falling prices, the head office no meeting with loss. The branches were being assessed under this bill to meet that loss.

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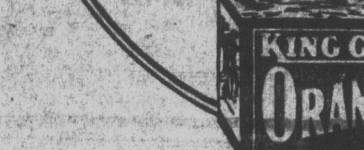
