SMART LISTENED TO . HE JUDGE

And Did Not Hear Compilments—A Number of Judgments Delivered.

The Court of Appeal sat yesterday and delivered judgment in the following cases: At the commencement of the court Æ Irving, Q.C., moved for leave to set down for argument the case prepared by the Attorney-General in regard to the Local Option Bylaw. The court thought that the several municipalities should be notified of the motion, and directed that notice should be given them.

The first case in which judgment was delivered was that of re Smart infants. This was an appeal from the judgment of Mr. Justice Ferguson at the trial in favor of the mother of the infants and directing that she should have the custody of the children. Chief Justice Hagarty, Mr. Justice Osler and Mr. Justice Meredith, who sat on the appeal in place of Mr. Justice Maclennan, gave judgment dismissing the appeal and upholding the judgment of Mr. Justice Ferguson. The Chief Justice spoke in anything but complimentary terms of Mr. Smart's conduct and said that the charges made by him against his wife could not be nelieved. Mr. Justice Burton dissented from the judgment of the court and thought the appeal should be allowed. Smart was present during delivery of the judgments and heard them through without funching.

Beaty v. Smart.—This was an appeal from the judgment in favor of the plaintiff of Mr. Justice Rose in an action for the recovery of possession of certain land in the town of Port Hope. The appeal was dismissed with costs.

Long Point Co. v. Duncan, Long Point Co. v. Anderson.—There was an appeal in each case from the judgment of the Queen's Bench Divisional Court reversing the judgment of Mr. Justice Maclennan refusing to prohibit the judge of the County Court of Norfolk and the plaintiffs from proceeding with certain actions in the Division Court. The Division Court actions are for damages for deer killed by the defendants on the plaintiffs' premises without license. The court allowed these appeals with costs.

The Division Court actions may now be proceeded with.

Beck Mfg. Co. v. Simpson.—An appeal by the plaintiffs from the judgment of Chief Justice Armour dismissing the action, which was tried before him at Barrie. Action for damages for delay in delivering a certain barge, The Victor, sold by the defendant to the plaintiffs. The court dismissed the appeal with costs.

Parlow V. Graham,—An appeal by the plaintiff from the judgment of Mr. Justice MacMahon at the trial in an action for the balance of an account for merchandise supplied to the defendant. The defendant set up a counter claim which was allowed, and from this the plaintiff appealed. The appeal was dismissed with costs.

Redmond v. Can. Mut. Aid Assn.—An appeal by the defendants from an order of the Queen's Bench Divisional Court setting aside the judgment of Mr. Justice MacMahon in favor of the plaintiff upon the findings of the jury in an action tried at Whitby, and directing a new 'trial. Action by the widow of a deceased person upon a benefit certificate in the nature of a life insurance policy. The court allowed this appeal with costs.

Gibb v. Arner.—An appeal by the plaintiff from the judgment of the County Court of Essex dismissing the action, which was brought to fecover from the defendant accrtain mare taken out of plaintiff's possession by the defendant under a chattel mortage thereon, given by one James M. Gibb, the plaintiff's brother, to the defendant. The appeal was dismissed with costs.

Griffith v. Crocker.—An appeal from the judgment of Mr. Justice Street at the London Assizes setting aside a chattel mortage as fraudulent and void.
