Maines' Ruling In Crichlow Case

Mint League Prexy Makes Ban Johnson Version of Penalizing Look Like a Joke

President Maines, of the Mint League, writing to the sporting department of The Free Press, states that he intends keeping Player Crichlow out of the game for the remainder of the season, but that he will reinstate him if he is sold or traded to another club.

When President Heard was told about this it proved to be his first intimation, stating that he had received a bulletin from Maines which briefly conveyed his ruling in the matter early in July to the effect that Crichlow was suspended indefinitely and that a fine of \$100 must be paid to the league on or before July 17.

It seems that Maines has taken it upon himself to make a rule that players who attack umpires be expelled from the league for the remainder of the season, without first securing the authority from the league directors.
