The steamer stopped one and a half days at Marseilles. We went ashore but it simply poured rain all the time which prevented us a great deal from sight seeing. It is a very busy city, such a number of big steamers get coaled up here. We got off at Lisbon and secured a guide who could speak English to show us around. We went to the royal palace which was the residence of King Emmanuel and his mother. The workmen were repairing the palace that had been shattered by the attack against the King's life. They are going to turn it into a national museum. Portugal wished no king to run the country. The royal carriages that we saw were simply beautiful, some of them four hundred years old. The seats of some of them were of ivory and gold. We then saw Belem, an old monastery. It is too beautiful to describe, the carving in solid stone. The whole monastery is held up by one large pillar, the altar being of solid gold. We are at Port Said and then we pass through the Red Sea through Egypt. I expect it will be pretty warm there. The sun is nice and warm now, but cool at nights. Oliver is just fine and I have the company of a lady friend, a Mrs. Porter.
