No Special Railway Rates For Conventions

Delegates to conventions this summer will be forced to pay full fares on the railroads. The decision not to grant reduced rates for convention parties was reached at a meeting of the members of the Canadian Passenger Association held in Montreal a few days ago.

The railway companies claim such action was made necessary in the interests of the conservation of fuel and labor. It is expected that the ruling will have the effect of reducing the number of delegates to conventions by at least 50 per cent.

The same order will apply in the case of cricket, lacrosse, baseball and all other forms of athletic sports, laborers' fares, raftsmen, baggage, etc., and weekend fares, all of which have been cancelled. There will be no chance in the special rate afforded commercial travelers and special rates will be made for charitable institutions, Salvation Army officers, nuns, sisters of charity, deaconesses and representatives of the newspaper fraternity.

OBITUARY

The following additional particulars regarding the late Wm. Ansley are to hand:—The death took place at Medicine Hat, on March 18th, 1918, of Mr. Wm. Ansley, formerly of Watford, Ont., after an illness of nearly three months. He contracted a cold which developed into pneumonia, while other complications set in which finally terminated in his death. He was born near Toronto on Aug. 25th, 1842, and was the last of a family of seven. When a boy the family moved to Lambton County, settling in Broke, where he endured all the hardships of the pioneer life. The deceased always took an active part in municipal affairs having served on the council at different times. He also was interested in church and S. S. work having been Supt. of the S. S. at Walnut. Later he moved to the 18th sideroad of Warwick, where he resided until 1899, when he again took up the pioneer life in the west, moving his family to Rouleau, Sask., where he was engaged in the lumber and coal business at both Rouleau and Drinkwater. Selling out his interests to the Davidson, Fraser Lumber Co., of Moose Jaw, he went to Medicine Hat, Alta., being attracted by the gas and coal of that city. Here he and his son Harvey, bought what was afterwards known as the "Ansley Coal Mine of Medicine Hat" which they had just sold. The funeral was held from his late residence 437 6th St. on Thursday, March 21st, at 2.30, and was very largely attended. Service was conducted by the Rev. R. L. McTavish, of Fifth Avenue Methodist church, after which interment took place in Hillside Cemetery. The pallbearers were—Messrs. Bennett, E. Thorne, C. J. Wilson, R. H. Kent, H. Lang and Jno. Ross.

Sheriff Flintoft Dead


Sarnia, April 5:—James Flintoft, aged 76, sheriff of Lambton County for 26 years, died at his home, "Pinehurst," today. About a year ago he was struck by a bicycle, and has been unwell ever since. Besides his wife he is survived by one daughter, Miss Frances of Sarnia, and three sons, George deputy sheriff of Lambton; Albert and Percy. The latter resides in Montreal. Sheriff Flintoft succeeded his father in the office when the latter resigned in July, 1872, after 19 years' service. Sheriff Flintoft was born at Perth, in Lanark County, but came to Sarnia when three years old. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon at Lakeview Cemetery.
